The Sociology 100 Introduction to Sociology course is a survey course of the Sociology discipline and is designed with several goals in mind. Sociology is a scientific discipline that studies how social groups influence human action and interaction. Through this course, you will learn the analytic methods of inquiry sociologist use when they examine virtually all aspects of human social life, particularly the influence of gender, race, class, region of the country, and type of community, on an individual's value, behavior, and expectations.

You will be exposed to the differences and similarities among cultures within the United States and the world. We will focus on the contribution of social institutions like family, education, the economy, and make in shaping a society's knowledge. Through discussion of these sociological issues the course will enable you to think critically about the social world in which we live. This course fulfills one of the Explorations requirements in the Social/Behavioral Sciences category in the new Colonnade program.

A key thing to remember about your journals is that quality is more important than quantity. Essentially 300 words of critical thought and reflection will get a higher grade than five hundred words of fluff and shallow reflection. • Each journal will be due by 11:59 Sunday of the week that it is assigned.

EXAMS • There will be three exams in this class. Each exam will consist of 40 multiple choice and true/false questions. Four short answers. And one Essay question. The short answer and essay questions will come directly from classroom discussions. True false and multiple-choice questions will come from your textbook.
• The final exam will NOT be comprehensive.

QUIZZES • There will be a total of 10 quizzes throughout the semester. They will cover the weekly readings. HINT HINT: these will be great study guides for your exams
