

Introduction to Psychology (Psy 100 750-12049)

Course Description:

This course fulfills a portion of WKU's Explorations category of Social and Behavioral Sciences and addresses the objectives of that area. Students will demonstrate the ability to:

1. Demonstrate knowledge of at least one area of the social and behavioral sciences.
2. Apply knowledge, theories, and research methods, including ethical conduct, to analyze problems pertinent to at least one area of the social and behavioral sciences.
3. Understand and demonstrate how at least one area of the social and behavioral sciences conceptualizes diversity and the ways it shapes human experience.
4. Integrate knowledge of at least one area of the social and behavioral sciences into issues of personal or public importance.
5. Communicate effectively using the language and terminology applying to at least one area of social and behavioral sciences.

Course Requirements:

1. **Regular participation** in all class activities is expected. Assignments--whether reading quizzes, responses to discussion topics, review questions, or tests-- *are posted on a limited-time schedule*. Once the time has expired, you will not be able to access the material, and the points possible on the activity will be lost.
2. **Reading assignments** are critical. In the absence of classroom lectures and discussions, it is especially important to have a good general understanding of the material presented. *It would be helpful to keep a loose leaf or spiral notebook consisting of your personal outline of the chapters*, since this will serve to focus your attention to the main ideas.
3. It will be necessary for you to have computer and Internet access; you will be required to use **Blackboard** and your account with them should be up and running by January 13. Blackboard recommends using the Firefox Web Browser, which can be downloaded free at: <http://www.mozilla.com/en-US/firefox/ie.html>, but I personally find Internet Explorer and Chrome work better for me. Even so, you may sometimes find that you are not able to do some routine assignment-- rather than giving up on the process, try closing out that browser and log into another, which may allow you to continue. You will also need to have access to PowerPoint to view presentations in some modules. You **should not** rely on your smart phone to complete and submit your work. There are many parts of Blackboard that do not show up, except with special effort on your part, and you will miss assignments, explanations, and other important parts of the course. Use a PC for accessing assignments and submitting them to me.
4. Losing internet connection or failure of your primary computer **will not** be an acceptable excuse for not finishing coursework on time, unless you have documentation from the Blackboard Helpdesk that your problem was out of your control. You should have a backup plan for this eventuality--lab computer on campus, another computer in the family, etc. When problems occur, your best resource is the WKU HelpDesk, at (270) 745-7000. When you speak to them, be sure to get a case # and copy of their report to email me in case the problem caused you to need to submit the work after the due date.

6. **Computer security** is essential, and WKU will allow you to install a security system on your computer, free of charge. Call the HelpDesk for accessing this program, if you do not already have it.

Cheating and/or plagiarism will result in an automatic "F" for the task, and depending on the severity of the problem, could result in an "F" for the course. 8. ****KEY POINT!!!** Your **syllabus** is your "safety net" for staying on track throughout the semester and avoiding problems that could arise without being fully informed of requirements. As such, **you should print a hard copy to keep in your notebook materials and become very familiar with it.**

Research Component: (Departmental Requirement)

Psychology is a science. The principles that students learn from textbooks and in psychology courses were derived from scientific research. To enhance the students' understanding of the research process in psychology, they are required to satisfy a research component as a part of Introduction to Psychology. Failure to meet the research requirements fully and on time will result in a grade of *Incomplete* for the course. The student must complete the required number of credits in order to have the appropriate letter grade assigned.

Students are required to earn twelve **(12)** research credits. Students may earn credit by any of the following means, in any combination:

- 1) The student may volunteer to serve as a research participant in an approved study being conducted by Western Kentucky University Psychology or Psychological Sciences faculty or students.
- 2) The student may complete a written research summary of a published article from an approved psychology journal.
- 3) The student may propose or ask for an equivalent alternative, which must be approved in advance by the Study Board Administrator (StudyBoard@WKU.edu). An account on the Department's Experiment Management System (<http://www.wku.edu/psychological-sciences/studyboard/>) will be established for each student at the beginning of the semester. The system will automatically email each student with the login information. **This website handles all research scheduling and credit administration. Only credits for which you register online will count toward research credit.**

Credits are earned accordingly. Each 15 minutes of research participation is worth one (1) credit. There are studies listed on the website with credits that vary from one to eight or more. Study Board credit may also be earned through an alternative assignment in which a student takes article quizzes. For information about this alternative assignment, see:

Assignments:

1. **Weekly modules** will be available beginning each Monday night (12:00 Midnight, Central time and ending the following week at the same time (Monday night, 12:00 Midnight, CT).
2. This class will use Blackboard for all **assessments** except the final test. There will be 10 brief (10-20 multiple choice items) teacher-prepared quizzes on reading assignments to help guide your reading and understanding of textbook material. The final test must be taken at the WKU Testing Center at any of the WKU campuses, or at a pre-approved university near the home of students living distant from the WKU campuses. Testing center will send instructions early in the semester—be sure you print and file with your other notebook materials for this class so you will have it at the proper time for registering for the final.
3. **Responses** to specific articles, topics from the textbook, etc. Occasional short (1-3 paragraph) responses to let me see that you understand the topics. These will be designed to help you "feel" and empathize with situations we encounter during our lifespan.
4. **Unit Tests** will cover the modules selected and will contain a number of multiple choice questions (usually 30-50) from a large pool of test questions; the computer will randomly assign the items, so that no two students will have exactly the same test, although many items may appear on several different tests. These questions will earn 75% of the test grade; the other 25% will be based on answers to 5-7 open response questions prepared and graded by your instructor.
5. **Discussion Board** responses. See "Discussion Board Policies and Procedures" in General Information Tab.
6. **Research Component.** (See specifications above) **This is a Psychology Department Requirement** for all students enrolled in PSY 100 classes.
7. **Student Information Sheet (SIP).** Required response; found in the General Information tab. *Each student must mail, via USPS, the completed sheets to the instructor at the address above.*
8. **Cheating or plagiarism** will result in an automatic "0" for an activity. Plagiarism is a serious offense. The student **must** give researched author(s) credit for any source material used. To lift content directly from a source without giving credit is a flagrant act. To present a "borrowed" passage without citation after having changed the wording, even if the source is cited in a general way, is also plagiarism. Plagiarism detection software will be used at instructor's discretion.
9. **Makeup work** will be allowed rarely, and on a case-by-case basis at instructor's discretion.
10. Many problems can be avoided by being familiar with this syllabus. You will be expected to have a hard copy of it in your notebook available to you at all times.

Grading:

- a. A total of 500 points will be earned by taking five **Unit Exams** and one **Final Test**.
 - i. Each exam will be worth 100 points.
 - ii. If student has taken all 5 unit exams, the lowest of the scores will be dropped.
 - iii. If a student fails to take a Unit test, or does not submit it within time limits, the test score is 0, and will be used as the "dropped" score.
 - iv. The final test is required, and will be proctored. (See "General Information")
 - v. **Therefore, best 4 Unit Exams=400 points, 1 Final Exam=100, for total of 500 points.**
- b. A total of 100 points may be earned by **participation in-class activities** such as:
 - i. Brief **responses to topics proposed by your instructor**, or **reading assignments** from internet sources, submitted via Blackboard. These will be for various point values, generally from 5 to 15 points
 - ii. **Completion of required assignments**, such as the Student Information Page, etc
 - iii. **Participation in online discussion groups**. See "Discussion Groups" in General Information for a possible 30 points during the semester.
 - iv. **Extra Credit** may be earned by contributing **reports on current research or issues**, and/or **articles from newspapers and/or magazines** which you find related to the topic under discussion. These must include a ***brief summary of the article including the date and source*** of the article, along with a copy of the article. 5 points will be credited to students who provide the *first* reporting of any specific article. These articles will be submitted directly to the instructor *via email* upon student's inclination to do so. No more than 5 articles may be submitted throughout the semester, for a total of 25 points possible. Maximum of *one article per week; final submission by 4/30/18*.
- c. A total of 100 points may be earned from **online quizzes** covering reading assignments.
 - i. quizzes will have limited time on Blackboard; be aware of time constraints.

- ii. quizzes will consist of 10-15 multiple choice, matching, or short-answer questions on material assigned.
- d. A total of 100 points may be earned for successful completion of work on the **research component**. 50 points will be awarded for students' completion of the required credits, and up to 50 points will be awarded for the quality of the reporting of the research activities. Details will be provided.
