Instructional Methods

The course is taught on-line using Blackboard as the delivery format. Instructional methods will include a variety of teaching strategies to meet the needs of students with various learning styles. During the course you will be listening/viewing lectures delivered using Mediasite, engaging in discussion board assignments, reading various material, and viewing NBC clips, youtube, and other videos. All lectures will be enhanced with handouts which will be available on Blackboard.

Information about evaluation methods:

- I. **Discussion Board**: Discussion boards are valuable as a means for you to communicate with your peers in the course. Please refer to rubrics for discussion boards.
- II. **Personal Philosophy of Leadership:** Students will complete a personal philosophy of leadership. The grading rubric will be posted on Blackboard.
- III. **Book Report:** Students will complete a book report on the book *The Fred Factor*. The grading rubric will be posted on Blackboard.
- IV. **Poster Presentation:** Students will complete a poster presentation on an assigned topic from a list presented by the faculty member. The poster will be posted on the discussion board and then a discussion among all students regarding posters will occur. The grading rubric will be posted on Blackboard. If possible, you may form a group with one or two others in the class. Please see the rubric and watch the video for further information.

V. **Ouizzes:**

- Will be on-line
- Only one attempt will be available for quizzes.
- All quizzes must be taken during scheduled time frame. There will be no make-up quizzes.
- Quizzes will be on assigned chapters as well as other information presented or from assigned readings.

Statement of Student Commitment

We are pleased that you have made the commitment to continue your nursing education. The didactic (lecture) courses in the RN to BSN program are delivered using an on-line delivery method with limited face-to-face meetings on WKU's main campus. You can expect to have similar time commitments for an on-line course as you would in a more traditional course that meets weekly in a classroom environment.

For example, for each 3-hour face-to-face course, there would be a 3-hour time commitment per week for attendance at class. This same timeframe should be allotted for on-line classes. This is when you could watch lectures, take quizzes, submit assignments, etc. As with a face-to-face class, there is also an additional commitment for working on assignments, reading, and doing other class preparation. You should expect this to be approximately 6-9 hours per week for a 3-hour course.
