## **GENERAL EDUCATION CONTENT AND GOALS**


Biological Concepts: Evolution, Diversity & Ecology (BIOL 122) is an introductory majors-level course in Biology that emphasizes three main themes: evolutionary patterns and processes, diversity of life (bacteria, archaea, protists, plants, fungi, and animals), and ecological principles. This course fulfills Category II Explorations – Natural and Physical Sciences Requirement (E-NS). BIOL 122 is a required course in the Biology major, requires BIOL 123 as a corequisite, and can be taken either prior to or after BIOL 120/121. \*Please note that course performance is very important for students majoring in Biology: A grade of "C" or higher in the 120-series is required for advancement in the major.

#### **Course Objectives**

- Understanding fundamental concepts in Biology
- Understanding factual and theoretical principles of evolution
- Broad surveys on the global-scale diversity of life
- Understanding basic ecological principles
- Developing critical thinking and scientific reasoning skills
- Understanding the relationships between modern society and biological concepts

**Learning Outcomes:** By the end of the semester, you will be able to...comprehend and use basic biological vocabulary (particularly evolutionary and ecological concepts), articulate an appreciation for scientific discovery, demonstrate sound scientific reasoning ability, demonstrate robust critical thinking skills, evaluate scientific data and results of research projects, and explain how biological science impacts society.

#### Homework

- Syllabus Quiz: You must complete the quiz to have access to your grades on Blackboard. •
- Readings: Chapter readings are "assigned" but are not connected to any points. This is to help you remember to read and stay caught up. Often, we will not cover everything in a chapter. The lectures will tell you in which sections to focus and which to skip.
- Dynamic Study Modules: Q & A practice that changes to meet your needs. You will also access these through Mastering. These are graded based on completeness. The length of each will vary based on your content proficiency. They are great study tools. Nobody's perfect: your two lowest DSM grades will be dropped.
