COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES

While the general pretext of this course is to have fun with one of the most visible institutions in society (sports), this is an upper-division Sociology course. Hence, there are a few academic objectives to be met. We will try to gain a better understanding of sport by studying it scientifically. Because this is a sociology class, the primary focus will be the application of sociological conceptions, theories, and ideas. We will look at the structure and organization of sport in society (particularly North American society) with an eye to analyzing sport critically. It is my hope that having completed this course, you will look at and understand sport in a new way as a result of having looked at it though a sociological lens. A critical analysis focuses on both positive and negative aspects of sport, both in the prominent way in which it factors into our lives and those around us, and in the way that it is organized in society. In many respects, sport provides great analogies to other life conditions and experiences, so a systematic understanding of the concepts and structures that are the infrastructure of sport should position you to be able to understand more thoroughly many of the features of society. In other words, we hope to gain a sense of how the institution of sports is increasingly influencing society and being influenced by it.

Chapter Assignments: There will be short (20 multiple choice) open-book quizzes associated with each of the assigned chapters in the Coakley text. Each quiz will be worth 10 points (0.5 points for each question). Once opened, you can save your work until you are ready to submit it. Once submitted, your assignment score will become final and the assignment cannot be re-opened to make changes. It will be available to you for studying purposes, until the end of the day when the exam for that section is taken.

Exams: There will be three exams that will count prominently toward your final grade. Each exam will cover roughly one-third of the course materials. The exams will be similar in format, consisting of multiple-choice and short answer/essay questions that draw on lectures, readings, and any videos you might watch. Each exam will be worth 100 points. Each exam may be taken at home, but should be taken without referring to notes or the textbook. In order to help with compliance, the exams will be timed (1 hour maximum) and once started, you must complete the exam in that sitting. Because the semester is very short, completion dates are suggested in the schedule below. Each exam may be taken as early as you'd like, but MUST be completed by the time indicated in the schedule.

Issue and Reaction Papers: You will be expected to write two (500 – 1000 words) issue papers, one for the first half of the course and the other for the second half. Each will be worth 40 points. Students will read and summarize articles relating to issues from the class. The summaries should include an overview of the article's main message(s), a description of how the article "fits" into the course, what was most interesting, and what you learned that you did not know before reading it. Due dates will be Wednesdays of the 2nd and 3rd weeks of the class. They are listed in the class schedule below.

(1) Exams: There will be three 100-pt exams. Exams = 300 points.
(2) Summary papers: (2 x 40 pts.) summary papers Papers = 80 points.
(3) Chapter Assignments: 12 Assignments (12 x 10pts each)
