Professional Issues in Nursing

Catalog Description

This course will examine issues and trends in professional nursing practice. Students will focus on the influence of social, legal, economic, historical, political and ethical forces on professional nursing practice.

Information about evaluation methods:

- I. **Discussion Board**: The Discussion Board is an important part of the learning opportunities. Please refer to rubrics for discussion boards.
- II. **Summary of** *The Code of Ethics* and *Nursing's Social Policy Statement*. These are two very important documents for the professional nurse. These were introduced in N323. You will be expected to re-read these two documents and write a short one-two page paper related to each *Nursing's Social Policy Statement*. A rubric for grading the assignment will be available on Blackboard. The other document will be utilized for your ethical assignment.
- III. **Professional Resume:** Each student is expected to develop a professional resume which could be used as part of the application process for a nursing position. A rubric for grading the professional resume will be posted on Blackboard.
- IV. **Ethical Assignment**: This assignment is to demonstrate your knowledge of ethical dilemmas. You will view assigned videos and submit paper following guidelines noted on rubric associated with this assignment.
- V. **Final Paper:** The final paper provides you the opportunity to reflect on your educational journey in the RN to BSN program. You will be expected to illustrate your philosophy of nursing, how you have achieved the program outcomes, describe a nursing model/theory you use to guide your practice, and share your thoughts on how past and future ethical, social, historical, political, economic forces have shaped the health care delivery system and nursing practice of nursing. A rubric for grading will be posted on Blackboard.
- VI. Class Participation: A mandatory face-to-face meeting is scheduled for November 15th or November 16th

VII. Quizzes:

- Will be on-line
- Only one attempt will be available for quizzes.
- All quizzes must be taken during scheduled time frame. There will be no make-up quizzes.

 Quizzes will be on assigned chapters as well as information from articles and other resources referenced.

Statement of Student Commitment

We are pleased that you have made the commitment to continue your nursing education. The didactic (lecture) courses in the RN to BSN program are delivered using an on-line delivery method with limited face-to-face meetings on WKU's main campus. You can expect to have similar time commitments for an on-line course as you would in a more traditional course that meets weekly in a classroom environment.

For example, for each 3-hour face-to-face course, there would be a 3-hour time commitment per week for attendance at class. This same timeframe should be allotted for on-line classes. This is when you could watch lectures, take quizzes, submit assignments, etc. As with a face-to-face class, there is also an additional commitment for working on assignments, reading, and doing other class preparation. You should expect this to be approximately 6-9 hours per week for a 3-hour course.

You will be participating in on-line discussions in this course. It is expected that in addition to following guidelines on rubrics, you will be respectful of your peers. You may pose questions and/or challenge a view of a classmate, but this must be done in a courteous manner.
