Western Kentucky University School of Nursing Nursing 503 Advanced Health Assessment Summer 2018

Course description: Emphasis is on the advanced skills and techniques of interviewing and health assessment that are utilized by the nurse in primary or acute care settings. Diagnostic laboratory studies will be discussed as they relate to the nurse in advanced professional practice.

Objectives: At the completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Develop theoretical knowledge required to complete a comprehensive health history and physical assessment on an adult and a child
- 2. Begin to utilize and interpret diagnostic studies including x-ray and laboratory procedures in the diagnosis of human condition.
- 3. Differentiate normal from abnormal findings obtained from the health history and physical assessment.
- 4. Identify differential diagnosis based on the history, assessment, and other objective data.
- 5. Consider diversity (i.e. cultural, developmental and socioeconomic) issues in assessment.

MSN Program Outcomes related to this course:

- Demonstrate proficiency in the utilization of research and quality improvement, including problem identification, awareness of outcomes, evaluation, and dissemination of research.
- Analyze emerging organizational, financial, political, and technological issues confronting Nursing and society as a basis for enacting change.
- Practice from an ethical perspective that acknowledges conflicting values and rights.
- Assume and develop practice and professional roles to meet societal needs to promote high quality, safe, patient care.
- Integrate theory and research from Nursing and related disciplines as a foundation for advanced practice.

- Integrate theoretical knowledge of health promotion and maintenance and illness/disease prevention to achieve
 optimal health.

Instructional Methods: This course will be taught using on-line asynchronous instructional and teaching methods. This technology will allow the distribution of class materials and announcements that apply to this class only. Students may reach Blackboard through the Western Kentucky University homepage and follow the directions on to the login page. You are responsible for checking for updates and changes and you MUST have a WKU e-mail account/address for rapid communication with the instructor. WKU assigns all students an account. The final examination is on-line and is a 50-question multiple choice comprehensive examination. You will have 60 minutes to take the exam.

Course Information: This course builds on the skills of basic health assessment. The emphasis is on interpretation and utilization of health assessment data collected to formulate differential diagnoses. There is less emphasis on examination techniques of basic health assessment. Students who feel they require remediation on basic assessment techniques should be proactive in seeking opportunities for review. Faculty will be happy to assist the students in this remediation endeavor.

In order to pass this course, the student MUST achieve at least an **80% average** on the total quiz and test grades, including the final exam. The final grade recorded will be the quiz and test grade average when the score is less than an 80% to reflect this requirement. Case study grades will be added to calculate the final grade for those achieving 80% or above test average.

The final grade in the class must be a "B" or above to progress in the program. Students failing to obtain a minimum of a "B" may not progress to any further clinical courses until a grade of "B" or higher is received in NURS 503.

<u>Quizzes</u>

All quizzes will open at 8am on the Monday of the beginning of the Week (see weekly assignment schedule and close at midnight on Sunday of that week).

There will be regular quizzes, which cover the content of the assignments of the lesson presented. The majority of the quizzes are multiple choice. You will have 25 minutes to complete the quiz. There is a penalty if you exceed the allotted time. If a student exceeds the time allotted, the following deductions will be made:

- < 2 minutes no deduction
- > 2 minutes 2 point reduction

Cardiac Rhythm Quiz

There will be one cardiac rhythm quiz. The student will be asked to identify the rhythm strip presented correctly. The rhythms presented are assumed to be 6 seconds in duration. A minimum of 80% is required. If you feel you need remediation in this area, please contact me.

Case Studies will be posted on the discussion board under the Discussions button. Discussion Board due dates, a discussion board rubric, and specific instructions will be posted on line.

Cheating

A score of zero will be applied to any assignment in which academic dishonesty has occurred.
