This syllabus explains what, you, **the student**, need to do so you will be <u>totally</u> clear as to all expectations and procedures. **Your first step** is to print out a **hard copy** of this syllabus and **keep it handy** with your other Spanish materials for easy access:

### Mission Statement:

Through coursework, experience abroad, and other cultural encounters, the Modern Languages Program cultivates communicative skills and cultural awareness that prepare students at Western Kentucky University to be more knowledgeable and sensitive citizens of the global community.

### **General Information:**

Spanish 102 is the second course in the elementary sequence designed to develop some basic communicative skills by focusing on pronunciation, oral practice, readings on Hispanic culture and civilization, and essentials of grammar. The articulation of high school Spanish is: Completion of three years (or three block semesters) of Spanish in High School equal Spanish 102. The student is <u>strongly encouraged</u> to take the CLEP exam to receive credit for previous study.

### Catalog Course Description:

Spanish 102 is a beginning course designed for those students who have studied the Spanish language previously (either in high school or one semester at the collegiate level).

#### Course Objectives:

-- engage in oral and written exchanges with the ability to initiate and sustain interchange including providing and obtaining information, expressing feelings and preferences, and exchanging ideas and opinions on topics of personal interest such as those mentioned above.

#### 2. Cultures

-- understand cultural information and relationships between cultural perspectives, products, and practices, especially as they relate to the Hispanic countries.

-- use appropriate cultural behavior in social and survival situations.

#### 3. Connections

-- use the Spanish language to reinforce subject matter and learn new information in academic areas such as history, geography, art, anthropology, mathematics, and literature.

#### 4. Comparisons

-- develop insights into their own language and culture, through reading and listening activities which deal with Spanish speakers in the students' community and abroad.

#### 5. Communities

-- Students will be more aware of opportunities to practice and hear the Spanish language outside of the classroom in activities such as concerts, movies, lectures, exhibits, and festivals.

# Student Learning Through Study Tips and Free Tutoring/Help:

The estimated time you should spend per chapter is between 10 and 15 **hours**. Of course, this is an average and some vocabulary or grammar sections will be easier than others. Each chapter builds so be sure that you have a good understanding of the structures of one chapter before moving on to the next. Do not try to cram for the test and then discard the knowledge. It will be the framework for your next test, the final and your oral evaluation. Another tip is that if you are not writing and/or speaking when you are studying, then you are not studying.

You must take control of the tutoring situation. You must explain to the tutor with what you need help. This free service is highly recommended for those who need more explanation and practice. The Internet is also a wonderful source. You can google whatever you are having issues with (eg/ tener expressions) and a plethora of sites will appear with extra explanations as well as practice quizzes. Tutors are available in DUC on main campus. Online tutoring is also provided by AARC. Please, see their website for more information.

# Detailed Description of Components <u>Student Learning Through Web Student Activities Manual (Web-SAM)</u> Homework:

This online SAM contains workbook (vocabulary, grammar, pronunciation and culture), video and laboratory activities that reinforce the material presented in each lesson of the student textbook. You are expected to memorize vocabulary and verb forms, view videos, read and complete exercises on readings and culture selections. These assignments are **DUE on the date indicated on the online calendar**. They are done online at <u>www.myspanishlab.com</u>.

The *Anda!* on-line supplement supplies students with a wealth of resources and a supportive environment for completing assignments.

NOTE: 'Technical difficulties' will not be acceptable excuse for incomplete assignments from the Web-SAM, so be sure to avoid any such problems by completing

the exercises in a timely manner.

## Student Learning Through Tests and Final Exam:

All tests **must** be taken on the dates indicated on your syllabus. If you miss a test, you forfeit the points. There will be no makeup tests for any reason nor will we double subsequent test points nor make any other accommodations to atone for your not taking the tests on the assigned days and times.

You will have 2 tests plus one final exam over vocabulary, grammar rules, grammatical structures, and some culture covered in the chapters. The final exam is cumulative. The format is true/false and multiple choice. The types of exercises on the tests and final are similar to the online homework. If you consistently read, practice and understand the textbook activities and the online exercises, you should do well.

There are study guides and practice tests available on blackboard.

You will only be allowed to log in once. You will have 90 minutes to complete the tests. You cannot use any class or text materials or notes and are expected to be honest.

### Student Learning Through Discussion Boards:

Between five and six questions will be posted for each chapter on the discussion board. You will need to directly respond to two questions and respond to two classmates. So, you will have a minimum of four posts per chapter. You are expected to answer in complete sentences in Spanish. You are required to use proper Spanish punctuation, which includes upside down questions marks, accent marks, tildes, etc. If you do not know how to create Spanish characters on the computer you are using, you will need to google it to find out how.

## Student Learning Through the Culture Report:

You are required to write a research/reaction paper in English. A list of topics is provided on Blackboard from which you will choose one to research. It is to be 2-3 pages, typed, 1 inch margins on all sides, double-spaced in Comic Sans 10. You will need to use a minimum of 3 sources and are prohibited from using Wikipedia as a source. As these topics require research, you also must cite throughout your paper and provide a works cited page in either APA or MLA format. You will provide information on your topic and then write your reaction to what you have learned. Also, be sure to run a spell and grammar check before submitting your paper. The due date is on the course calendar.

## Student Learning Through the Oral Exposé:

You are to videotape yourself speaking in Spanish for 2-3 minutes. The topic, as well as more details is provided on blackboard. DO NOT stray from the topic. I have assigned it in order to assess your ability to use certain vocabulary and grammatical structures. Try to make it flow as easily as possible without it sounding like you are a robot. I suggest that you write it out and familiarize yourself with it before you tape. You may use your paper as a guide, but I do not want to watch you read directly from a paper. As stated above, try to make it as natural as possible. The use of online translation sites will result in a '0'.

You will upload your video to blackboard (instructions and more information are provided on blackboard).
