Course Title from the Catalog: Theories of Addiction

Catalog Description: Theories in etiology of addiction, theoretical orientation for preventions, intervention, and treatment, basic pharmacological principles of mood altering chemicals and ethical practice.

Enrollment Restriction for Course: Graduate Status

Plagiarism:
