Welcome to SPM 300- Sport and Public Policy. This course is designed to provide students with an understanding of the social, political and economic dynamics of the sports industry and how these fluid relationships shape public policy in regards to sports. To ensure a worthwhile experience, students must be organized, motivated and willing to participate.

Course Description:

This three credit hour course will examine the social, political and economic impact of national and international sport. Topics include structure of public finance of sport, sport and public health, community ownership, globalization of sport, and professional sports.

Objectives:

Upon successful completion of the course, students should be able to do the following:

- 1) Explain how sport programs are affected by public policy.
- 2) Explain the political economy of sport facility development and summarize the rationale for public finance of sport stadia.
- 3) Describe the professional sports labor market which includes the globalization of the work force, work stoppages, collective bargaining, and player's salaries.
- 4) Identify public policy factors that contribute to, and detract from physical activity of American citizens.
- 5) Critically analyze economic impact studies and explain their justification as rationale for developing public policy.
