DANC 110: DANCE APPRECIATION

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

A general study of the various forms of dance with emphasis on the contributions each has made to the performing arts and the development of our culture. This course is designed to develop awareness and appreciation of dance in its artistic, social, and cultural contexts.

General Education and Course Goals:

This course helps fulfill the requirement for Category C: Social and Behavioral Sciences in Western Kentucky University's General Education program. It will help you attain:

- an informal acquaintance with major achievements in the arts and humanities
- an historical perspective and an understanding of connections between past and present

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- 1. To develop the student's understanding and appreciation of what dance is and how to perceive and evaluate dance. Upon successful completion of this course, students should be able to articulate an understanding and perception of the following questions: What is dance? Why do we dance? What do I feel about dance?
- 2. To provide the student with an abbreviated history of theatrical dance and its relationship to culture
- 3. To introduce the student to all aspects involved in the production of theatrical dance
- 4. To introduce students to the various dance-related careers
- 5. To provide an atmosphere that encourages critical thinking through class discussion of reading material, videotapes and live performances.

After completing your exam, the questions are graded and a score is given immediately. Students can access their grades by going to "Grades".

DISCUSSION BOARD

Students are required to participate in online discussions of course topics. E-mail to the instructor will NOT be considered class discussion. The class has been divided into groups for the discussion boards. Discussion questions will be posted in the "Group Discussion" section of the Blackboard main course page as announced. When a topic is proposed by the instructor, students will need to participate in "Group Discussion" about that topic at least two times and on two different days by the due date posted. This participation will be tracked by the instructor. Your grade for discussions will be based on the frequency and quality of participation. Your discussion postings should demonstrate thought and application of reading materials and/or videos and should be respectful to peers.

In the case that inappropriate or disrespectful student communication is received via the discussion board, the instructor reserves the rights to deduct points from the participation component of the grade, delete it without answering questions or responding in any way, and retain copies to be used as evidence in student disciplinary proceedings.
