Course Description:

This course provides an overview of organization and management principles, theories, and practices in the health care environment. Topics include the components of the healthcare delivery system such as medical office practices, hospitals, and long-term healthcare systems.

Course Objectives & Overview:

The purpose of this course is to introduce students to issues in the U.S. health care delivery system, with particular emphasis on topics related to the administration of health system operations, leadership, and management.

Upon completion of this course, students should be able to:

- 1. Illustrate how the U.S. health care system has evolved
- 2. Determine major factors responsible for changes in the healthcare delivery system
- 3. Explore relationships in planning, management, financing, and service delivery
- 4. Analyze the role of legislation, policy, workforce, and technology in transforming the delivery of care
- 5. Evaluate population dynamics and their effect on costs, quantity, quality, and types of care
- 6. Contribute meaningfully to the discussions on healthcare reform and propose ideas for addressing some of the persistent challenges facing the healthcare system

Course Policies:

Course Content and Evaluation:

Course Assignments/Requirements: As this is an online course, we will utilize discussion boards to facilitate interaction among class members. Chapter PowerPoints will NOT be provided by the Professor as students are expected to read and access the book chapters and current topics in order to learn the material. Learning is further facilitated and graded by utilization of the following methods:

Discussion Boards: Three (3) discussion boards will constitute the class participation portion of your grade. In order to receive full credit, a student will be required with each discussion to respond adequately to the posted question/statement/activity and then comment thoughtfully on at least two (2) of their peers' responses. More detail available on the Discussion Board Grading Rubric.

Reading Quizzes: A total of three (3) quizzes will be given, one per module, and will be based on the assigned readings for the module. Once the quiz is submitted, students will no longer be able to view quiz questions, only the corresponding grade. Any specific questions about the quiz will be directed to the professor via email.

Quizzes are time limited. Students that step away from their computers or that lose connection access due to inactivity or time expiration will not be allowed to redo these items. It is the student's responsibility to assure that he/she has a working computer and sufficient internet access and time to complete the reading quiz in the allotted time. Only one attempt is allowed and the quiz submission will be automatic if time expires before the student submits the quiz. The quiz may include matching, true/false, short answer, multiple choice.

Reading Review Chapter Questions: In lieu of a research project or examinations, students will be required to answer the assigned review questions for each chapter covered during this course. Each question must be answered thoughtfully to provide evidence of learning and understanding the material for that corresponding chapter. In addition, the page number(s) where the information was found must be provided with each answer. More detail and examples are provided in the Chapter Review Questions Grading Guideline and/or grading rubric.

Annotated Bibliography: In lieu of a research project paper, presentation or examinations, students will complete ten (10) current article reviews on specific topics covered in this course. Only peer reviewed, full articles or documents dated since 2011 and that can be accessed via Google Scholar will be acceptable sources. More detail and examples are provided in the Annotated Bibliography Grading Guide and/or grading rubric. Both a draft and final paper are required.

Examinations- There are no examinations required for this course.

Grading/Evaluation: The standard university grading scale will be used: 90-100 (A); 80-90 (B); 70-79 (C); 60-69 (D); below 60 (F). Any grade at a .5 or higher is rounded up to the next number. Any grade at a .4 or lower is rounded down.
