#### **CNS 110 Human Relations**

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#### **Course Description**

Theory, concepts, and skills necessary to increase self-awareness and improve relationships in social and academic settings. Processes of managing the problems of everyday life including conflict and social demands.

#### **Course Objectives**

At the conclusion of the course, the student should be able to:

- Demonstrate general knowledge of human relations
- Apply knowledge, theories, research methods, and ethical conduct and research methods to analyze problems pertinent to human relations
- Understand how human relations conceptualize diversity and how it shapes human experiences
- Integrate the knowledge of human relations into issues of personal importance
- Effectively communicate using the language and terminology germane to human relations

#### **Required Texts & Materials**

Students are expected to complete all required reading for each class session and bring the book to each class meeting.

## **Methods of Instruction**

The course is a mixture of on-line quizzes, group discussion/exercises, and personal exercises.

# **Course Requirements**

Attendance, Preparation, and Participation (3 points possible per class meeting)
Attendance is required during all scheduled class meetings. Students are responsible for all information if class is missed. More than 4 missed class sessions will result in an "F" in the course. Active participation during each class session is assessed. Students are expected to come to class prepared with all assigned readings and homework assignments. Class participation will be evaluated upon the following for each class meeting:

- Attendance at the entire class meeting (1 point)
- Thoughtful, respectful and appropriate contributions to activities and discussions (1 point)
- Evidence that reading assignments and/or other activities were completed (1 point)

Cell phones must be turned off at the start of class unless there is an emergency situation. Laptops should only be used during class lectures and should be put away during activities and discussions. Use of cell phones and laptops is considered discourteous when other students and the instructor are involved in demonstrations or experiential activities. Inappropriate use of technology will result in loss of participation points.

## **Journal Entries** (5 points for each entry)

There is a journal entry for each chapter. Each journal entry will be evaluated upon the following: (a) thorough personal reflection of the chapter that at least addresses what parts of the reading are personally applicable, what was new and interesting, and parts of the reading you agreed with and/or disagreed with and why; (b) sufficient effort that demonstrates that the reading was completed and entry is at least a lengthy paragraph; (c) correct grammar and sentence structure. Journal entries should first entered in a Word document, edited for correct grammar and sentence structure and then pasted in into the Blackboard entry box. Journal entries cannot be edited or deleted upon submitting through Blackboard. Journal entries are due by 11:59 pm CST on the date noted; late entries are not accepted.

# **Quizzes** (10 points for each quiz)

There will be a quiz on Blackboard for each chapter. Quizzes will be taken towards the end of the class period and in GRH 2056 (classroom 2). Quizzes can be taken one additional time prior to August 10th if students would like to attempt to earn a higher grade on it. Questions are randomized for each attempt. Each attempt must be completed in one sitting. The highest grade will be recorded. Quizzes will not be available after the due date.

# Final Exam (20 points)
