Course Description:

Physical therapy examination, evaluation, and assessment of individuals with neurologically-based movement disorders. Prerequisites: Open only to DPT students in good standing.

Course Objectives:

At the completion of the course content, the student will be able to:

- 1. Analyze common movement tasks and problems and adapt the evaluation to meet needs of individual patients.
- 2. Differentiate between normal and abnormal postural control and compare its relationship to balance. (7D19r))
- 3. Demonstrate ability to perform a safe and skillful subjective and objective examination that addresses the cognitive, affective, and sensorimotor aspects of the patient by selecting age appropriate tests and measures. Tests and measures include, but are not limited to:
 - a. arousal, mentation, cognition (7D19l)
 - b. sensorimotor assessment including sensory integrity (7D19g) (7D19p) (7D19u)
 - c. posture (7D19r)
 - d. motor control (7D19n)
 - e. coordination (7D19n)
 - f. balance (7D19d)
 - g. righting and equilibrium
 - h. functional assessments (7D19f)
 - i. gait and assisted locomotion (7D19m)
 - j. joint integrity and mobility including tone (7D19k)
 - k. ROM (7D19s)
 - 1. assistive and adaptive devices (7D191) (7D19f)

- m. environmental, home, and work barriers (7D19f) (7D19h)
- n. reflex integrity (7D19f)
- 4. Differentiate between musculoskeletal limitations, neuromuscular impairments, and sensory impairments through the use of screening and functional assessment. (7D19f)
 - a. Evaluate conditions not appropriate for physical therapy intervention and describe how to refer for appropriate care. (7D16)
 - b. Provide culturally competent first-contact care to patients/clients needing physical therapy services. (7D34)(7D8)
 - c. Cooperates, collaborates, communicates, and integrates care with other health care practitioners as necessary to meet the patient's/client's needs. (7D28) (7D7)
- 5. Utilize functional assessment tools to establish the presence of neuromuscular impairments. (7D19)
- 6. Based on examination findings, formulate an appropriate evaluation and prognosis, set appropriate goals in a safe manner. (7D20) (7D23) (7D43)
- 7. Explain the importance of outcome assessment and its impact on plan of care and patient status. (7D30)
 - a. Discuss importance of outcomes assessment in neurologic physical therapy in terms of patient outcomes, efficacy and effectiveness of interventions, financial considerations, and access to healthcare. (7D37)
 - b. Document results of selected outcome measures in a consistent and precise manner in individual patient/client records. (7D32)
- 8. Demonstrate ability to document neurological examination findings for multiple conditions and effectively present them when collaborating with other practitioners and support personnel. (7D25) (7D32)

Develop a safe and effective plan of care that includes diagnosis, prognosis, appropriate interventions and includes short- and long-term goals that demonstrates evidence-based principles including consideration of literature, clinical experience of the therapist, available resources, collaboration with other professionals, and incorporation of individual patient values beliefs and goals. Course Structure and Learning Experience:

This course combines lecture, lab, demonstration, and Blackboard teaching emphasizing knowledge of theoretical and clinical approaches to patient/client management of individuals with neurologically-based movement disorders. Lecture will encompass presentation of examination, evaluation, and assessment techniques for patients with neurologically-based movement dysfunction. Concurrent laboratory will focus on the psychomotor aspects of these techniques. The integration of concepts from this and previous classes must be evident in all written work, examinations, and performance on practical examinations.

The student will gain knowledge in this course from the combination of 1) lecture material, 2) classroom demonstrations, 3) group discussions 4) presentation of case studies, 5) laboratory experiences, and 6) Blackboard activities and Mediasite lectures. Emphasis will be placed on accuracy of patient examination techniques, the ability to interpret test results and application of movement science in the development of intervention approaches for individuals with neurologic dysfunction. This course will prepare students to perform elements of patient/client management with this patient population in clinical settings.

Evaluation Methods:

1. Attendance

Attendance and promptness to class will be monitored. Students are **considered tardy** if they do not arrive and sign in before the scheduled starting time (i.e. for an 8:00AM class, must be <u>in your seat at your desk</u> ready to go by 8:00AM, signing in no later than 7:59AM). As such, 1% of the total grade will be taken off per tardiness and 2% of the total grade will be taken off per **unexcused absence**.

2. Practical Examinations

Students must perform a practical examination; the instructor will grade students on each performance criterion using their professional judgment in regards to the following areas: quality of care, supervision/guidance required (verbal cueing), and accuracy/consistency of performance, complexity of task/environment, safety, and efficiency of performance.

During the Practical Examination, students will demonstrate effective and efficient patient client management with an emphasis on examination, evaluation, and diagnosis. Students will perform an examination or part of an examination on a real or simulated patient (case study) with a neurologically-based movement disorder. In order to accommodate the needs of patients who may be donating their time, date and time may occur outside of scheduled laboratory class times. Students must pass the practical examination to pass the class.

3. Practical write ups

a. For the practical examination, students will generate a report of the assessment of their patient including examination data, evaluation of those data, PT diagnosis, and prognosis including plan of care. Detailed instructions and grading rubric will be provided separately. A practice write-up will be performed.

4. Testing

a. Exam

One final exam will be given during the course of the semester. The exam will be comprehensive over the total material of the course, and all students must take the exams. In the event of emergency/illness, students must contact the instructor to arrange to take the examination.

b. Quizzes. There will be 3 quizzes during the course. Quizzes will be over reading assignment, lecture, Mediasite, and or lab content. Students will participate in 4 lab activities.

5. Lab Activities

Participation in all lab activities are required. Failure to participate in laboratory activities will result in point deduction from overall grade.
