This interdisciplinary approach is key to developing a healthy "gerontological imagination," a necessary base for the study of gerontology. Throughout the semester you will become familiar with key facts, theories and concepts to help you reflect on the most important topics confronting our aging society. The fun <u>and</u> challenge of this class will be for you to decide how to resolve these issues in a well reasoned and argued manner.

Course Objectives By successfully completing this course, students will be able to

- 1. define basic terms used within social gerontology,
- 2. analyze societal and individual consequences of demographic changes in an aging society
- 3. explain how people are shaped by societal and cultural factors as they age,
- 4. identify and discuss current issues in social gerontology and aging
- 5. gain exposure to elders in your community by developing a consultant case study.

Required Text: Aging: Concepts & Controversies by Harry (Rick) Moody 9th Edition

It's acceptable to use the  $8^{th}$  edition although page numbers will be different and a few controversies have been altered. You are responsible for reading the assigned reading.

#### **Assignments**

All assignments should be submitted double-spaced and in Times New Roman 12 pt. font, Please cite facts and arguments that you use to back up your assertions. You may use whatever citation format you would like (I work in APA). Here is the general rule – I enjoy learning new things, and it is helpful when I can find your citation.

**Brief Paper Assignments:** Each unit has an assigned paper topic which should be a minimum 3 pages in length (and an additional page for references). The objective of these assignments is to expose you to matters that affect older adults in our everyday lives. Please cite peer reviewed sources, and IF you are citing a web-site, it should only be from a governmental or foundation source – not popular press unless there is a compelling reason to do so. Please use APA style or another format. Papers are to be 100% free from spelling and grammar errors.

#### **Due Dates:**

Unit 1 no later than Sep 24. Discuss how social roles may change with chronological age. Pick at least three examples (roles).

Unit 2 no later than Oct 29 "How does economic and social class across the lifespan affect access to health care in later life?

Unit 3 no later than Nov 26. "Choose a side and argue using logic and cited references why the "right to die" should be legalized throughout the U.S."

Summary of Journal Readings Oct 9: You will select ten articles from an approved list of gerontological journals and write 2-page summaries, double spaced describing what you learned from each <u>article</u>. No more than two <u>articles</u> can come from the same journal. The journal articles should <u>be published</u> in the last six years. Each summary needs to <u>be accompanied</u> by a full reference citation to the article. This assignment allows students to individualize the course readings to meet their own personal and professional interests for a maximum of 100 points (10 per journal summary). \*\*HINT\*\*It is suggested that you pick journal articles that are relatable to the questions you may ask your interviewee for the senior case study.

**Online Discussions:** On Blackboard, there is a "Discussion Board" where we will conduct threaded, asynchronous discussions on aging issues. With such a small class, this <u>discussion</u> should be easy and <u>interesting</u>. <u>Helpful if you place your response at the beginning of the week, rather than at the very end to facilitate discussion and dialog</u>. Complete all 10 (10 points a piece) for a maximum of 100 points.

## Senior Case Study Project- due no later than Dec 3rd.

For this project, you will need to identify an older adult, your "older consultant." Ideally, this should be someone that is NOT a close family member.

#### Complete compliance (ethics) courses BEFORE beginning your research.

http://www.wku.edu/compliance/training.php this needs to be completed by **September 17**<sup>th</sup> meet the minimum requirements listed in the next bullet and have appropriate time to complete the final paper. You need to complete: [1] Social/Behavioral Research Course (live human beings) & [2]Social and Behavioral Responsible Conduct of Research Course (RCR). Each of the two modules has been reported to take roughly a minimum of 2-3 hours to complete; please consider this in your research timeline.

Please upload a copy of your CITI completion report to the Blackboard site – under assignments.

To receive a favorable grade, you should be meeting with your consultant at least one hour each week (for a minimum of four times or weeks)

- Complete all three "check-ins" by the due date for maximum credit.
- Keep a log of these meetings including date, time and place. Following each meeting record subjects discussed, information gained, ideas or hypotheses about the adult individual and their ecological contexts (e.g. spouse, family, community, society) stimulated by the conversation, etc. Your log can be in outline form.

• As a suggestion, use the information learned from your meetings to investigate further what may have already been researched. For example, you can find an article on the subject, write a summary, and also embed this information into your paper properly cited.
