HIS 358 - 700 SPRING 2016, BLACK AMERICAN HISTORY TO 1877

This is an online class so you must have regular access to a computer and to the internet. Make sure to log on to the course in Blackboard at LEAST once a week to keep up with assignment and announcements. An on line course is not necessarily easier, and in some cases harder. It will require just as much if not more time than an in class course. The advantage is you can work the course at your own time instead of sitting in a classroom. It is necessary to complete an assignment to be considered "attending". Just checking into the lesson with no submittal of work does not count as "attending". However, by answering the discussion question you will not only be counted as ATTENDING but also earn two (2) points.

Course Description:

Traces the development of slavery in America from its beginnings in Africa until the end of the Reconstruction period, 1877.

History 358 looks at the Black culture, economy and the slave system. You will be presented with not only knowledge of African Americans and slavery, but develop an understanding of the reasons slavery began, the hardships, and the contributions by African Americans to the growing American society.

Course Goals and Objectives:

The student will learn to appreciate and understand the significance of African culture and have an understanding of the beginnings of slavery and the slavocracy of the South. We will learn the affects not only on the slave but the slave owners and the American culture.

Course Requirements:

- 1. Each week will be considered a lesson. Thus, lesson 1 is week 1.
- 2. Reading assignments You will have only one chapter to read each week (they are short) and either a supplemental reading and/or a document to read.
- 3. Lectures there will be a posted video lecture for each lesson with a power point and additional information, such as a suggested web site to read or a YouTube to watch.
- 4. After each lesson, or chapter, there will be a graded assignment consisting of three essay questions to answer from the lesson in no less than 125 words in one hour.
- 5. There will be assigned sections to read from your supplemental and there will be a graded assignment after the reading consisting of brief essay questions. There is a length requirement of a <u>minimum</u> of 100 words. You will have 45 minutes to complete
- 6. There will also be a short multiple choice quiz after each chapter; you will have 30 minutes to complete.
- 7. There will be a test after three chapters. The test will consist of multiple choice, true or false, identification and a brief essay. You will have two hours to complete.
- 8. The book report is due on Friday, April 7th , 2016 by 10:30 PM. You may go in and out of the posted requirements as many times as you need.
- 9. The Critical Analysis essay is due by 10:30 PM Friday April 28th, 2016
- 10. Your book report and analyses should be cited according the Chicago Method of citation.
- 11. There will be a final test due by 10:30 PM on Friday May 13th, 2016
- 12. All weekly assignments are due by 10:30 CT Sunday evenings. A TEST is not due until the following Monday at 10:30 CT.
