Course Description:

Course Requirements:

- 1. **Regular participation** in all class activities is expected. Assignments--whether reading quizzes, responses to discussion topics, review questions, or tests-- are posted on a limited-time schedule. Once the time has expired, you will not be able to access the material, and the points possible on the activity will be lost.
- 2. **Reading assignments** are critical. In the absence of classroom lectures and discussions, it is especially important to have a good general understanding of the material presented. It would be helpful to keep a loose leaf or spiral notebook consisting of your personal outline of the chapters, since this will serve to focus your attention to the main ideas.
- 3. It will be necessary for you to have computer and Internet access; you will be required to use Blackboard and your account with them should be up and running by January 12. Blackboard recommends using the Firefox Web Browser, which can be downloaded free at: http://www.mozilla.com/en-US/firefox/ie.html, but I personally find Internet Explorer and Chrome work better for me. You will also need to have access to PowerPoint to view presentations in some modules.
- 4. Losing internet connection or failure of your primary computer **will not** be an acceptable excuse for not finishing coursework on time, unless you have documentation from the Blackboard Helpdesk that your problem was out of your control. You should have a backup plan for this eventuality--lab computer on campus, another computer in the family, etc. When problems occur, your best resource is the WKU HelpDesk, at (270) 745-7000. When you speak to them, be sure to get a case # and copy of their report to email me in case the problem caused you to need to submit the work after the due date.

- <u>6.</u> **Computer security** is essential, and <u>WKU will allow you to install Norton security system on your computer, free of charge. Call the HelpDesk for accessing this program, if you do not already have it.</u>
- 7. **University Policies:** You must follow all policies and regulations regarding academic dishonesty, plagiarism, etc. as stated in the WKU undergraduate student handbook. Cheating and/or plagiarism will result in an automatic "F" for the task, and a second offense will result in an "F" for the course. - 8. **KEY POINT!!! Your syllabus is your "safety net" for staying on track throughout the semester and avoiding problems that could arise without being fully informed of requirements. As such, you should print a hard copy to keep in your notebook materials and become very familiar with it.

Assignments:

- 1. **Weekly modules** will be available beginning each Monday night (12:00 Midnight, Central time) and ending the following week at the same time (Monday night, 12:00 Midnight, CT).
- 2. This class will use Blackboard for all **assessments** except the final test. There will be 10 brief (10-20 multiple choice items) teacher-prepared quizzes on reading assignments to help guide you to better reading and understanding of textbook material.
- 3. **Responses** to specific articles, topics from the textbook, etc. Occasional short (1-3 paragraph) responses to let me see that you understand the topics. These will be designed to help you "feel" and empathize with situations we encounter during our lifespan.
- 4. **Unit Tests** will cover the modules selected and will contain a number of multiple choice questions (usually 30-50) from a large pool of test questions; the computer will randomly assign the items, so that no two students will have exactly the same test, although many items may appear on several different tests. These questions will earn 75% of the test grade; the other 25% will be based on answers to 5-7 open response questions prepared and graded by your instructor.
- 5. **Discussion Board** responses. See "Discussion Board Policies and Procedures" in General Information Tab.
- 6. **Critical Review of a Research Study.** A review of scientific research which shows the students' ability to approach published information with a critical eye, taking into account principles of research which we will study during the course. Specific information regarding the assignment will be given at the proper time: the purpose for this assignment is for you to be able to locate and access documented information about something *you* are interested in, but do not have a complete understanding of, and to critique the processes used and the conclusions reached in the study.
- 7. **Student Information Sheet (SIP).** Required response; found in the General Information tab.
- 8. **Cheating or plagiarism** will result in an automatic "0" for an activity. Plagiarism is a serious offense. The student **must** give researched author(s) credit for any source material used. To lift content directly from a source without giving credit is a flagrant act. To present a "borrowed" passage without citation after having changed the wording, even if the source is cited in a general way, is also plagiarism. Plagiarism detection software will be used at instructor's discretion.
- 9. **Makeup work** will be allowed rarely, and on a case-by-case basis at instructor's discretion.
- 10. Many problems can be avoided by being familiar with this syllabus. You will be expected to have a hard copy of it *in your notebook* available to you at all times.

Grading:

- **a.** A total of 500 points will be earned by taking five **Unit Exams** and one **Final Test**.
 - i. Each exam will be worth 100 points.
 - ii. If student has taken all 5 unit exams, the lowest of the scores will be dropped.
 - iii. If a student fails to take a Unit test, or does not submit it within time limits, the test score is 0, and will be used as the "dropped" score.
 - iv. The final test is required, and will be proctored. (See "General Information")
 - v. Therefore, best 4 Unit Exams=400 points, 1 Final Exam=100, for total of 500 points.
- b. A total of 100 points may be earned by participation in-class activities such as:
 - i. Brief responses to topics proposed by your instructor, or reading assignments from internet sources, submitted via Blackboard. These will be for various point values, generally from 5 to 15 points each.
 - ii. Completion of **required assignments**, such as the Student Information Page, etc.
 - iii. **Participation in online discussion groups.** See "Discussion Group Participation" for a possible 30 points during the semester.
- c. **Extra Credit** may be earned by contributing **reports on current research or issues**, and/or **articles from newspapers and/or magazines** which you find related to the topic under discussion. These must include a *brief summary of the article* including the date and source of the article, along with a copy of the article. 5 points will be credited to students who provide the *first* reporting of any specific article. These articles will be submitted directly to the instructor *via email* upon student's inclination to do so. No more than 5 articles may be submitted throughout the semester, for a total of 25 points possible. Maximum of *one article per week*.

- d. A total of 100 points may be earned from **online quizzes** covering reading assignments.
 - i. quizzes will have limited time on Blackboard; be aware of time constraints.
 - ii. quizzes will consist of 10-15 multiple choice, matching, or short-answer questions on material assigned.
- e. A total of 100 points may be earned for a 4-6 page **research critique**. Details will be provided.
