Course Description: This course is designed to help students explore and analyze some of the difficult ethical, legal, and social dilemmas confronting patients, medical practitioners and other health-care professionals in contemporary society. Consideration will be given to the philosophical, theoretical, and practical aspects facing both, health care providers and health care consumers. Students will be presented with ethical situations commonly encountered in the delivery and consumption of health care services. Students will also be exposed to various Codes of Ethics which guide the health professions. Through the use of case studies students will be challenged to resolve an array of ethical dilemmas. Finally, students will discuss a contemporary health and medical ethics case study.

This course is structured differently than your traditional F2F course. It is presented in a weekly folder so it is pretty much self-paced meaning that you can proceed at your own pace. However, you will need to adhere to the due dates. LATE ASSIGNMENTS WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

This course requires students to be familiar with Blackboard. Course assignments can be found on Blackboard, and you will be expected to submit your work via Blackboard LMS. This course requires critical thinking and extensive writing in APA format. Be familiar with the APA formatting.

Course Objectives

Upon completion of the course, students will be able to:

1. Discuss the role of personal values and principles as they apply to ethical decision making.
2. Compare significant ethical theories in terms of their key values or principles.
3. Recognize and discuss the obligations and ethical responsibilities of health care professionals to various stakeholders.
4. Identify and discuss the challenges inherent in clinical ethics in areas such as informed consent, patient self-determination, confidentiality, and genetic technologies.
5. Compare and contrast the ethical considerations of various perspectives regarding health care allocation, and access.
6. Analyze and assess the impact of health policy on various health issues and to various stake holders.
