Course Description:

The focus of this class is the roughly 300 years of the feminist movement primarily in the U.S., from the 17th century to the mid-twentieth century. We move at a very rapid pace through incredibly exciting material. You'll find the readings exciting, challenging, humorous, outrageous, mind-bending, and in some cases, familiar.

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to

- identify key writings in the evolution of Western feminism;
- understand intersections of gender, race, class, and sexuality in feminist theory;
- formulate critical arguments on the ideas of pioneering feminists.

Discussion Board (Db): (see Course Information > Discussion Board Requirements)

Discussions of readings and responses to others' comments are the <u>single-most important</u> ongoing requirement of this course. You absolutely must schedule your participation in such a way that others have a chance to reply to you and you have a chance to reply to them without concentrating our exchanges in one or two days. **You must post your first original post of the week no later than Wednesday or it will be considered late**. This means that you get to a computer for a serious and focused writing session <u>at least twice</u> and preferably three times a week, with <u>at least one day between</u> sessions. My suggestion: you get the week's reading finished by Tuesday and generate a thread and respond to at least one other person and then return by Thursday and generate a <u>second</u> thread and respond (again) to at least one other person.

Db Grading:

For full credit, you should expect to post **at least 1,500 words/week** including **at least two original posts and three response posts** (2,000 words/week is more common)—see **Course Information** for a fuller discussion of this. Your comments should address the readings. Anecdotes are acceptable but not as a replacement for engaging with the material. Tangents are also often helpful, but not instead of responding to the readings.

Synthesis Papers:

You will compose two 8-10 page synthesis papers. Each paper will ask you to reflect on a topic, issue, or theme you see in a minimum of four of the texts assigned for class. You must also include personal experience and reflection when synthesizing the materials. In other words, I expect you to use first person and to incorporate your experiences as credible evidence. However, I also want to emphasize that the synthesis papers are **formal academic essays**; therefore, your synthesis papers must have a clear thesis, supporting claims, and substantial evidence from the course readings and your experience. I expect your synthesis papers to be free of grammatical and mechanical errors and to clearly cite any and all outside sources using an accepted format such as MLA or APA.

Group Project:

In groups of three to four, students will prepare a presentation to share with the class. The format of this presentation is up to you. You could produce a wiki, blog, or webpage, and I encourage you to use the tools available through the course Blackboard site. I will assign students to a group during the third week of the semester. The group project should directly address the course material. You could prepare a webpage outlining the history of reproductive rights, introducing a specific feminist activist or theorist, or exploring a feminist school of thought.

Academic Integrity:

It is understood that students will present their own work for all assignments. Student work will be checked using plagiarism detection software. Plagiarism, cheating, or any other form of academic dishonesty will not be tolerated. Academic dishonesty will result in either failure of the assignment or failure of the course and will be reported to the WKU Office of Judicial Affairs. Late Assignments:

Assignments submitted after the due date will be penalized one letter grade for each business day it is late. Assignments late more than five business days will receive minimal partial credit.
