## MATH 515: Introduction to Number Theory Western Kentucky University – Spring 2022

**Course Description:** An introduction to number theory, including, but not limited to, divisibility, quadratic reciprocity, theory of primes, Fermat's Theorem, Euler's Theorem, application problems.

Learning Outcomes: After the completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Reason and communicate proficiently in mathematics with regards to describing and explaining theory and application of number theory.
- Write rigorous mathematical proofs using theory development and a theoretical understanding of number theory.
- Analyze and generalize problems and their solutions.
- Make connections to topics taught in various branches of mathematics at various levels.
- Reason and communicate proficiently in mathematics with regards to describing and explaining theory and application of number theory.

Prerequisite: Admission to the Master of Arts in Mathematics program or permission of instructor.

Textbook: Pommersheim, J. (2010), Number Theory. Wiley.

Internet Access: You must have regular access to the internet to access email and the course website (Blackboard). This will help ensure that you do not fall behind. My primary forms of communication with you will be email and the discussion boards. Please check your email regularly and save class emails for future reference.

Attendance: We will not have a set meeting time when everyone will be online; however, you are expected to be online frequently each week to check your WKU email and the discussion board – this is <u>VITAL</u>. In a face-to-face class, we would meet in person just shy of 3 hours each week. In addition to this, you are expected to put in additional time outside of class for reading, completing assignments, and studying – this is typically figured as 1-3 hours per credit hour per week. So, in a face-to-face class that can range from 6 to 12 hours a week for one class. I will expect you to do the same amount work as if this course was meeting in person – I will not compromise the integrity of the course. Since we are not meeting in person, some students will find that they need to put in additional time to understand the material. Make sure you do not get behind!

**Assessment / Evaluation:** The course grade will be computed as follows:

**Discussion Boards (10%):** Even though this is an online course that utilizes an asynchronous environment, your participation is **expected** and therefore required. All homework questions should be posted on the appropriate DB forum/thread located on Blackboard so that the entire class can benefit from the discussion that follows the question. Please **do not** email homework questions. If you do, I will ask you to post that question to the DB. This ends up wasting valuable time. The rationale for this policy is that I want all students to benefit from all questions/comments, just as students would in a face-to-face class. The only exception to this rule is a question of a personal nature – those should always be communicated privately.

In each forum, you are expected to post comments and/or questions about assignments. Most importantly, you should respond to classmates' questions – just as you would participate in conversations during group work in a classroom. Since this "conversation" is not immediate in an online class, it is in your best interest not to wait until the last minute to work on your assignments. You should plan to spend time on the computer monitoring these discussions several days throughout the week. It is very important to keep in mind that while you may not have any questions to ask regarding problems that I assign, others will. Helping others is a GREAT way to reinforce your understanding of the material. In addition, sometimes you may think you think you understood a problem only to find out during a discussion that you were wrong OR that there were multiple ways to solve the problem. Participation in these discussions is a win-win situation.

Online discussions are a way for you to be "present" in class, like attendance in a face-to-face class. For each assigned DB, you will receive a fixed number of points. The number of points will be communicated at the time the assignment is made on the life-line calendar. If you meet all the requirements, you will receive all the points. If you do not meet all the requirements, you will receive a zero.

Tests (60%): Two exams will be given during the course of the semester. The exams will be proctored and announced well in advance so that arrangements can be made. Each exam will include a window of opportunity for you to take the test. This window will be several days, and it will always include a weekend. Only in extreme circumstances will a student be allowed to take an exam later than the testing window. Details about the exams will be communicated via email after classes are underway. It will be important for you to schedule your test right away so that we can make arrangements for any issue that arises.

Assignments (30%): Your homework will be weekly problem sets which will be posted each week. Please consult the life-line calendar each week for assignments. These assignments will be collected on a weekly basis and graded. More information about homework expectations can be found in the General Structure document posted on BB. You may at times want to consult mathematics sources in the library or on the internet. Feel free to share anything you reference with your classmates via the DB. You will find that doing the assignments and corresponding with classmates or with the instructor will increase your chances for success on exams.

All assignments should be turned in via the links given. Any assignment uploaded on Blackboard for me to look at should be either a <u>Word document or a PDF file – no other file types</u>. Handwritten assignments are acceptable if they are neat and scanned as a pdf file – no picture files. All assignments should be turned in as **ONE file**. Once an assignment has been graded and solutions posted, late assignments will not be accepted for any reason! The structure of weekly assignments, including due dates, will be explained in a subsequent document located on Blackboard. Also, please make sure that you do not copy your assignments into text boxes – your assignments **MUST** be uploaded as **ONE** document or **ONE** pdf file.
