Exams: Cumulatively 30% of your grade. The online exams are each timed for 90 minutes. Once you open the exam in Connect, the clock starts. You will have the opportunity to take each exam twice and Bb will record your highest score. The exam questions randomly chose 50 Multiple-choice questions from a large test bank for every exam – this means that no two exams will contain the same questions.

Smart Book / Homework Assignments: Cumulatively 30% of your grade. Assignment details are within McGraw-Hill Links. These may be completed an unlimited number of times before the due date.

Written Assignments: Cumulatively 28% of your grade. Due to the asynchronous nature of this online course, and the inability to speak in real time, it is expected that your written assignments be concise, APA cited, and most importantly accurate. All students must complete THEIR INDIVIDUAL WORK. Sharing work in ANY manner will result in a failing grade and dismissal from the course. Student work will be checked using plagiarism detection software. Students who properly cite relevant sources from our course text or Peer Reviewed Journals from WKU Libraries | Western Kentucky University, typically receives more favorable grades. Each written assignment is to be typewritten and free from grammatical and spelling errors, written assignments containing such errors will receive substantially lower grades.

- **Case Studies:** 20 points each. If diagrams/exhibits are to be created (i.e., case 4-1) you must handwrite them on a sheet of paper, take a picture, and upload them within the messages tab.
- **Discussion Boards:** 20 points each. 10 points for the original post (150 words) and 10 points for responses to **two peers** (50 words each).

When in doubt, regarding how to proceed in writing, always incorporate the 5 W's (who, what, when, where, and why (most importantly the why)) and incorporate relevant sources into your major claims.

Practice Operations Application-Based Modules: 12% of your grade. You have an unlimited number of attempts to reach the designated goal of achieving full credit. Please begin these modules early and proceed slowly. Fast is slow, slow is good, on these assignments. These modules are highly interactive exercises that provide students with a safe space to practice using problem-solving skills and apply their knowledge to solve realistic scenarios. Each scenario addresses key concepts and skills that students must use to work through and solve course-specific problems, resulting in improved critical thinking and relevant workplace skills.

Project management is a business tool that focuses on the project's central role in organizations, along with addressing the project life cycle and techniques for initiation, planning, scheduling, controlling and execution. Emphasis is on organizational, managerial, human behavior and interdisciplinary issues relevant for managing successful projects from the business perspective.
