Course Description

Advanced concepts of organization, administration and management of public health agencies and programs.

Course Objectives

1. Examine the demographic dimensions of the U.S. population and the consequences for health care delivery. Focus is also placed on inequities and variations in subgroups of the population.

- 2. Examine the trends in morbidity and mortality, including the major diseases and conditions which have created a demand for health services in the past, present and as projected into the future.
- 3. To examine the organizations and institutions which are major factors in the health care delivery system, including but not limited to hospitals, nursing homes, insurers and various other health centers.
- 4. To examine the major human resource components of the health care delivery system including physicians, nurses, allied health workers, non-health related specialists, and relationships to the general labor force. History, education, roles, trends and problems are stressed. Licensure, certification, and accreditation issues are addressed.
- 5. To examine and critically assess the role of government (federal, state, local) in the health care delivery system as they relate to policy, regulation, legislation, finance and direct delivery of services.
- 6. To examine the historical basis and context of health care financing and the impact of reimbursement policy on the current and future direction of health care delivery.
- 7. Through use of a group policy project, to integrate the multiple facets of public health and health care delivery by focusing on the impact and consequences of a specific actual case on the components of the system.

Course Assessments

Health Policy Assessments and Assignments: For the health policy assessments and assignments, students will be required to take several assessments and/or will respond to health policy articles posted throughout the semester. More details regarding this requirement will be provided later. Assess objectives 1-6

Examination: There will be one take home exam, which is cumulative and applied. Details will be provided later. Assess objectives 1-6

Policy Project: For the policy project students are required to assess and develop solutions to a specific state/city issues. For this assignment students will have to assess the problems and develop theoretically driven and evidence-based solutions. Students will also be required to address the needs of all stakeholders. Additional details will be provided later. Assess objectives 1-7

Grades: The standard university grading scale will be used: 90-100 (A), 80-90 (B), 70-79 (C), and 60-69 (D). All grades under 60 will be given a letter grade of F.
