Catalogue Course Description:

Interpretation of empirical research designs used in the field of speech-language pathology and audiology. Includes understanding the various statistical analysis used to determine research outcomes and their relevance to clinical practice.

Course Rationale: An understanding of research methods and interpretation will help you to approach clinical problems objectively and from an evidence-based orientation. Best clinical practice demands that you be lifelong consumers – if not producers – of research. This course will actively engage you in how to effectively, efficiently, and judiciously consume, understand and critique research.

Method of Instruction: Instruction will be provided through a combination of synchronous online classes utilizing Adobe Connect Software, Blackboard, reading assignments, and online learning activities. Asynchronous viewing of instructional material (e.g., pre-recorded lectures, supplemental video) may also be required
