DANC 110: Dance Appreciation

COURSE DESCRIPTION

A general study of the various forms of dance with emphasis on the contributions each has made to the performing arts and the development of our culture. This course is designed to develop awareness and appreciation of dance in its artistic, social and cultural contexts.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- 1. To develop the student's understanding and appreciation of what dance is and how to perceive and evaluate dance. Upon successful completion of this course, students should be able to articulate an understanding and perception of the following questions: What is dance? Why do we dance? How do I feel about dance?
- 2. To provide the student with an abbreviated history of theatrical dance. As well as provide an opportunity for students to understand and evaluate the historical, social and political connections between dance and society.
- 3. To introduce the student to all aspects involved in the production of theatrical dance.
- 4. To introduce students to the various dance-related careers.
- 5. To encourage critical thinking through reflective writing assignments following reading material as well as recorded and live dance performances.

COLONNADE AND LEARNING OUTCOMES:

This course helps fulfill the requirement for Explorations within the WKU Colonnade program. Specific learning outcomes include:

- 1) Students will use appropriate vocabulary for the description and critical analysis of dance performance. They will also explore the major components of various genres of dance technique, choreographic elements, creative approaches and terminology used in dance practice.
- 2) Students will demonstrate the ability to analyze dance choreography as observed in performance for the basic elements of dance composition, including space, time and energy. Students will also demonstrate the ability to distinguish and evaluate the corresponding production choices made by technical designers.
- 3) Students will analyze how social, cultural and historical contexts have influenced dance technique, choreography and performance throughout various historical periods and in various cultures.
- 4) Students will explore how dance artists have challenged, supported and/or shaped social values, political systems and aesthetic practices throughout various historical periods and in various cultures.

5) Students will identify choreographic concepts, ideas and artistic approaches in dance performance from a range of historical periods, and will examine how these issues as well as newer concerns are currently being addressed by attending and analyzing live dance performances.

CLASS CONTENT

Since this class is online, you are responsible for managing your time. You are expected to login to Canvas and check your WKU email daily. The Canvas calendar has been designed for you to use throughout the duration of this course. Each week has it's own module, which may contain the following materials: reading assignments, lecture videos, video aids, study guides, assignments, quizzes and exams. You may only work one week ahead. Reading, writing assignments, quizzes and exams are all due the week assigned by 11:59 pm CST on Fridays. No late work will be accepted. Make sure to check the Announcements daily: as reminders, clarifications, and special notes will be provided in that format.

QUIZES

Quizzes will be open book/notes and computer-based. Students will have one hour to complete each quiz once they have opened it. Quizzes may only be attempted once. Once you have submitted a question you cannot go back and change your answer.

EXAMS

This course includes two online exams. Students may take all exams from their personal computers. Students will have 120 minutes to complete each exam once they have opened it. Students will have only one attempt for each exam. After completing your exam, the questions are graded and a score is given immediately. Students can access their grades by going to "Grades". Essay questions are graded with the same rubric as the weekly assignments. Essays should be written at a college level with grammar, punctuation and content that showcases what the student has learned.

RESETS

Only one quiz OR exam per student will be reset throughout the duration of the course.

ASSIGNMENTS

Students are required to complete weekly assignments. Assignments will vary from writing a response to a written question, video, podcast, to submitting videos. Refer to the course calendar for all scheduled assignments. Students should open the week's module, and be prepared to

answer questions about ALL materials given which may include, lectures, readings, videos etc. Click the assignment tab and create a new entry to receive credit. **Do not write your response in the comments section, as this will not be accepted.** Your grade for these assignments will be based on the quality of your participation; basic writing skills and your ability to show the knowledge you have gained from ALL of the material comprehensively. **To receive full credit, responses should be a page in length, well-constructed and organized sentences, and demonstrate careful thought and in-depth response to the assigned topic.** No late assignments are accepted.

MANDATORY WKU DANCE CONCERT AND OBSERVATION PAPER

Students are required to attend and write about the one of the WKU dance concerts. Papers that DO NOT have a picture of their ticket stub and program attached AND have their ID scanned will automatically receive a zero grade. See the writing rubric and paper outlines for more details. This critique should demonstrate maturity and originality of thought reflected by the ability to analyze, synthesize and evaluate concepts and material from class along with correct grammar and spelling. Grading will be based on organization, clarity of ideas, and content. See the course calendar for specific due dates. Only students who study remotely will be assigned a different video project.
