This class participates in the WKU Store’s “Day One Access” program. As part of this program, the e-book version of the required textbook will be preloaded on your Blackboard account. Blackboard is the online platform for delivery of this web course. The cost of the e-book is about \$80 and will be placed on your student bill the day after the Add/Drop deadline (Sept. 4). Students who stay enrolled in Day One Access are also eligible to purchase an optional low-cost loose-leaf copy of the textbook. If you registered for this course before Sept 4th, you will have access to Revel through the WKU’s Blackboard, available on TopNet.)

Required materials will be delivered to you automatically by enrolling in this course. There is a process for students to opt-out of purchasing the etext, however, students are required to purchase the etext access for this course, The WKU Store will bill your Student Billing account, and you will see a charge appear under this Term along with Tuition and Fees (“Account Summary by Term” under the Student Services tab) labelled as “The WKU Store Purchases” after the Add/Drop period. How to Access Revel Once Revel has been integrated with Blackboard, I will announce on Blackboard and send an email to your WKU email address. You will then need to:

- Log in to WKU Blackboard (recommended browser: Google Chrome or Firefox) and select this course
- Select “Content” from the left navigation, then you see “Open Pearson”
 - Click “Open Pearson” then Launch “Revel”

When you access “Revel” for the first time, you need to register Revel by creating your Pearson Account. When you create a Pearson account, make sure that you use WKU email address During account

creation, you will be prompted to accept the Privacy Policy. If you are not 18 years old yet, please contact your parents in advance and get their permission to use the Revel system that handles your Personal Information (such as Account Data and Course Data).

(If you already have a Pearson Account for another product or service, you can use your existing username and password to access Revel. However, since the “Privacy Policy” section is new, you may be prompted to acknowledge the Privacy Policy.)

As indicated in the WKU Catalog, PSY 100 is “An introductory course dealing with principles of behavior, scientific methods of psychology, measurement, learning, perception, motivation, development, personality, abnormal behavior, social behavior, intelligence and other topics.” This course provides knowledge about the terminology and major principles of the science of human behavior from the cellular to the environmental and interpersonal levels. Note that PSY 100 and PSYS 100 are equivalent courses. This course is an introductory overview of the major principles, theories, and applications of psychology. As an overview, this course will cover a great deal of material in a relatively short time frame. Therefore, it is highly recommended that you keep up with the reading. Please note that unless informed otherwise, you are responsible for everything that is included in your course materials.

Grade Requirements

Quizzes (Located and Taken on Blackboard)

There will be 1 quiz per chapter for a total of 12 quizzes. These will be taken on Blackboard and are due by the end of the week the chapter is assigned. Each chapter starts on Monday of the week and ends on Sunday. Therefore, all quizzes are due by Sunday at 11:30 PM. Failure to complete a quiz by the due date/time will result in a grade of "0". Each quiz will be worth 20 points and the 10 highest quiz grades out of the 12 quizzes taken will count toward your final grade. In other words, the 2 quizzes with the lowest scores will be dropped, so your quiz grade will be based on 10 quizzes for 200 possible points. You are advised to read the chapter before taking the quiz so the quiz will serve as a check on your retention and selection of key points. Also make sure that you are at a reliable computer with a good

internet connection and an updated browser (Mozilla or Chrome; free downloads on WKU IT site) and software. The WKU Computer Labs are an excellent place for taking the quizzes. You will have only one chance to take the exam, so be prepared.

Exams (Taken at a Testing Center)

There will be a total of five exams (4 section exams during the semester and an optional comprehensive final exam). Exams will be comprised of 100 multiple-choice questions worth 1 point each for a total of 100 points. The Optional Final exam is 100 questions worth 100 points.

The final grade is based upon your performance on the 10 quizzes, and 4 out of the 5 exams. The final course grade is based upon your performance on 4 of the exams. If you are satisfied with your grade after the fourth exam, then you don't have to take the final. If you take all five exams, then your lowest score is dropped. There will be no makeup exams so if you miss an exam, you will have to take the final exam!

All exams are to be taken on a computer in a proctored environment within a 5 day time span. Students are responsible for scheduling the exam on TopNet with the WKU Testing Center or to arrange for a proctored location close to you. Specific directions will be sent to each student's WKU email account two weeks prior to the exam. WKU Testing Centers do not charge a fee; however, the WKU Remote Proctoring Network includes proctor locations who charge for services as well as those that don't. Students are responsible for payment of any proctoring fees if they choose to use a site that charges for services. Students are also responsible for any additional fees that might be associated with the use of a particular proctoring site, such as parking fees.

Assignments (Located and Submitted on Blackboard)

There will be required assignments to complete with each chapter covered and can serve to potentially increase or decrease points toward your final grade in the class. These assignments help you to interact with and better understand the chapter content. You will not receive a grade for each assignment other than a notation of whether the assignment was completed in the Blackboard gradebook. Bonus points (20) are awarded if all assignments are completed adequately and submitted. If less than 80% of the assignments are completed, points will be deducted from your total points for the class. The size of the deduction is proportionate to the number of assignments not submitted.

Final Grade

Your final grade is based on the total number of points that you earn during the semester. There are 600 points possible based on the quizzes (10 for 20 points each) and exams (4 for 100 points each).

*****REQUIRED RESEARCH COMPONENT*****

Study Board Requirement. NOTE: Failure to complete this requirement will result in a grade of Incomplete (X) for the course.

Psychology is a science. The principles that students learn from textbooks and in psychology courses were derived from scientific research. To enhance the students' understanding of the research process in psychology, they are required to satisfy a research component as a part of Introduction to Psychology (PSY100). Failure to meet the research requirements fully and on time will result in a grade of **Incomplete** for the course. **(WKU policy is that an "X" automatically turns into an "F" unless removed within 12 weeks of the next full term.)** The student must complete the required number of credits in order to have the appropriate letter grade assigned. Students are required to earn twelve (12) research credits.

Students may earn credit by any of the following means, in any combination:

- 1) The student may volunteer to serve as a research participant in an approved study being conducted by Western Kentucky University Psychology faculty or students.
- 2) The student may take quizzes over psychology research articles.
- 3) If you are under 18, you will need to email the studyboard and ask for an equivalent alternative, which must be approved in advance by the Study Board Administrator (StudyBoard@WKU.edu).

An account on the Department's Experiment Management System (<http://wku.sona-systems.com/>) will be established for each student at the beginning of the semester. The system will automatically email each student with the login information. **This website handles all research scheduling and credit administration. Only credits for which you register for through the Study Board website will count toward research credit.**

Credits are earned accordingly. Each 15 minutes of research participation is worth one (1) credit. There are studies listed on the website with credits that vary from one to four or more. Each satisfactory score on an article quiz is worth one credit. Article quizzes are offered approximately once per month, so students interested in this option must check the Study Board website regularly. Students who are under 18 may only earn Study Board credits through article quizzes, as they cannot legally consent to participate in research. The study board co-administrator, notes that...

- ❓ Study Board research participation is a great way to learn about the different types of research we do at WKU. Some studies take place in labs and require paper-and-pencil or computer tasks, some are online surveys, and others may require light exercise or the use of equipment like an ERP net or a heart rate monitor. All studies on the Study Board provide study board credit, and in addition, some will pay students cash or gift cards for participating.
- ❓ Students are free to sign up for any Study Board studies they are interested in, but they should make sure they are available at the time they sign up for, because failing to show up for two studies will automatically limit them to the alternative

assignment (see below). If for some reason they cannot show up for a study, they should contact the researcher (listed on Study Board) immediately.

- ❓ Students can use their 800# to log into Study Board here: <https://wku.sona-systems.com/> and then use the "Forgot Password" link to have their password sent to their WKU email address.
- ❓ 12 credits are required. Many studies are worth more than one credit, so it's unlikely that most students will have to participate in 6 separate studies to earn the required credit.
- ❓ Students who are under 18 or who do not want to participate in studies can complete the alternate requirement, which consists of reading articles and taking quizzes over them. There are only a few of these sessions per semester, so students who choose the alternative assignment need to check Study Board regularly for alternative assignment sessions. Several sessions are required to earn the full 12 credits.

StudyBoard opens August 27 and will close on December 7. Every student needs to access their account the first week of classes.

DO NOT contact the Studyboard to ask about studies. Contact the person(researcher) doing the study.

Extra Credit Opportunity: I will give extra credit as an incentive to completing the research component early. If you complete the research component by September 28, you can earn **20 points extra credit can be earned** and **10 points extra credit** will be awarded if you complete it by October 19.
