DANC 360: DANCE IN CULTURE (WEB) Winter/Summer

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course will offer a survey of world dance forms, emphasizing the social, cultural and aesthetic principles defining these forms. Through reading, online lectures, discussion, videos and research; dance in societies throughout Asia, Africa, Europe, North America and South America will be explored. The gender, racial, political and/or religious orientations that have shaped dance history will be examined.

This course helps fulfill the requirements for Section III/Colonnades requirements.

- An appreciation and exploration of the complexity and variety in the world's cultures.
- A basic understanding of contemporary issues around movement practices and global migration of dance styles.
- The ability to discuss how dance embodies and is a form of communication within a culture through myth, performance, and social happenings.
- Students will be challenged to make connections and developed a broader perspective of forms and discussion of these forms and cultures through blog writing.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- 1. To provide students with a fundamental understanding of dance as an art form.
- 2. To broaden the students' understanding of the relationships between dance and culture; in relation to social status, gender, religion, movement, and how this perspective affects perception.
- 3. To demonstrate an ability to analyze, discuss and describe movement, quality, and role, in a variety of contexts.
- 4. To provide an atmosphere that encourages critical thinking and enhanced research skills through class discussions/forums, research, observations, and writing assignments.

REQUIRED TEXTS:

Dancing: The Pleasure, Power, and Art of Movement, by Gerald Jonas *other reading requirements will be provided as a file upload or online link.

COURSE CONTENT

Since this class is online, you are responsible for managing your time. You are expected to login to Blackboard and check your WKU email daily. A <u>course calendar</u> has been designed for you to use throughout the duration of this course. Pay close attention to due dates for quizzes, blog assignments, papers, and exams; as no late submissions are accepted. Students will have access to most course materials, including quizzes, exams and blogs, from the beginning of the course through the due date listed in the course calendar. Exams and quizzes will be available at the start of each week. You are encouraged to not work too far ahead, as feedback on your blogs will need to be applied for success of future submissions and content application. Be sure to check the Announcements daily: as reminders, clarifications, and special notes will be provided in that format.

<u>Quizzes</u>

An online quiz will accompany each chapter. Quizzes can be found by clicking on the "Quizzes" tab of the course's main page. Quizzes will be open book/notes and computer-based. Students will have one hour to complete each quiz once they have opened it. Quizzes may only be attempted once.

<u>Exams</u>

This course will include three online exams. Exams can be found by clicking on the "Exams" tab of the course's main page. Students may take all exams from their personal computers. Students will have 90 minutes to complete each exam once they have opened it. Students will have only one attempt for each exam. After completing your exam, the questions are graded and a score is given immediately. Students can access their grades by going to "Grades".

<u>Blogs</u>

Students are required to participate in blogs of course topics. Topics will be posted in the "Blogs" section of the Blackboard main course page. Refer to the course calendar for scheduled blog assignments. Each assignment will be available to students from the beginning of the course through the due date as listed in the course calendar. **Topics will be prompted by instructor. To receive full credit, you must develop a full response discussing topics at a college thinking level. Posts that accomplish this tend to be a page to 2 page responses.** Feedback to each blog will be provided to allow the student to assess and apply corrections for improved submissions. Continue to use specific points to support your answers and think beyond what the general information is to develop critical thinking and analysis of topics. Movement/gesture, traditional clothing, social settings, the role of dance, political issues, ect. are to help support your answers in addition to being able to compare dance in a variety of different cultures.

*this requirement is subject to change according to the topic and assignment requirements. Any changes will be posted under each 'blog'.

*you are required to cite within your blog response for practice for your final research paper as well as to show your use of the text, videos, or outside sources.

Discussion Forum

A discussion forum will be available for students to discuss and ask questions to their peers. This will be a place to ask for clarity and help. Post your questions to this open discussion forum and peers can provide insight and help to questions that you may have when an online course doesn't always provide the 'conversation and discussions' about topics. The forum is a place to post questions and clarification about course material, quiz questions, or test questions that you didn't understand. Use this forum as a source of help in addition to re-reading the text, re-watching the videos, and re-assessing your questions. Once these tools are utilized I will be available to further clarify questions that you may still have. Students with sufficient responses and insight may possibly receive extra points. I will monitor this forum to post encouragement, clarity, and insight when needed.

<u>Research Paper</u>

One written paper will be required for completion of this course. The written paper will explore a form of world dance and its relationship to that culture. Guidelines for the paper can be found under the "Course Documents" tab on Blackboard. Late or incomplete papers will not be accepted receiving a 0/incomplete. Any paper not that does not include in-text citations/references will receive a 0/incomplete grade as this is considered academic plagiarism. Be sure to pay attention to the details and the requirements posted for the paper; *for example-* MLA format or Chicago Style Format, works cited page, in-text citations, and submission of paper topic. A submission of topic and initial sources will be required prior to the paper due date. This paper is the culmination of gained knowledge and articulation of the cultural significance of dance.
