Course Objectives / Learning Outcomes & Overview

Upon completion of the course, the student should be able to:

- Comprehend nature of research and the essential features of research design
- Critique the basic frameworks for quantitative, qualitative, and mixed methods
- research
- Select the key process elements of research for a project or thesis
- Deduce the correct use of form and style used for research papers and theses
- Demonstrate competency in the use of the APA style documentation system
- Formulate a research proposal for a graduate thesis

Course Topics

The purpose of this course is to provide an overview of research design. This overview consists of understanding the preliminary considerations that go into selecting a qualitative, quantitative, or mixed methods research design. These include knowing the definition for these different approaches, considering philosophical worldviews, reviewing the literature, understanding the use of theory, anticipating ethical issues, and developing writing strategies. We will discuss the process of research as it relates to each approach. This process includes writing an introduction, specifying a purpose statement, and developing research questions and/or hypotheses. This course will also discuss the methods and procedures for quantitative, qualitative, and mixed methods studies.

COURSE STRUCTURE AND DESIGN

The course will consist of readings from the assigned text and other supplemental materials, assigned homework, discussion of course content, the development of thesis proposal content, and the development of proposal drafts.

Assigned Readings

The textbooks and supplemental readings provide the content to support your success in completing homework assignment, discussions, development of thesis proposal content, and the development of proposal drafts.

Quizzes

Quizzes will be given from assigned textbook chapters and assigned supplemental materials associated with the given topic. Quizzes assess your knowledge of the thesis writing process, research design methods, and thesis procedure protocols.

Discussions

Online sessions will be geared to address questions and thoughts regarding the readings, and discuss ideas and theories. These discussions will be graded for participation, content, writing, and sources.

Research Rationale

Students will be expected to have a fundamental understanding of the research design frameworks through the development of a research rationale section to be incorporated into the proposal draft document.

Thesis Draft Proposal

Students will submit a draft of their thesis research proposal that will incorporate what you learned during the course. This draft will be comprised of the first three chapters of a complete thesis.

Thesis Draft Proposal

Students will submit a final draft of their thesis research proposal that will incorporate what they learned during the course. The final thesis proposal should build on the research rational and draft proposal.
