Aims of the Course:

This course offers a comprehensive introduction to different approaches to Interdisciplinary Studies as an academic research process or method. Specifically you will:

- Demonstrate your understanding of the importance of critical analysis, integration, and cultural relevancy when working in two or more fields or disciplines.
- Investigate and apply the issues, ideas, and theories relevant to your interdisciplinary focus.
- Demonstrate an awareness of how an interdisciplinary perspective impacts common organizational concepts and business practices.

Classroom Citizenship:

On occasion, your peers or I will post an idea or example that you may not like or that may not be consistent with your life experiences and/or beliefs. Semester Assignments:

1. Exploring Research Methods Overview 50 points

For this assignment, you will access the Harvard Online Writing Lab (OWL) to explore general concepts of conducting research, transferring research into written work, and properly referencing sources. You can access OWL via this link: <https://owl.english.purdue.edu/owl/>.

Your completed assignment will include:

- A summary of your **three most significant findings** from reviewing this site.
- A paragraph about how you will use this site to conduct future research, including the research in this class.

Note: This assignment will likely be approximately 1-2 typed pages submitted as an attachment to suefleschner@twc.com according to the posted schedule.

2. Critical Analysis of Interdisciplinary Topics – References 100 points

For this assignment, you will explore a variety of common organizational concepts and business practices. Please refer to the topic list below. For each topic, you will provide one dedicated resource that others in the class may leverage. The intent is that you draw upon your learning from the Exploring Research Methods Overview assignment. There will be a Blackboard Forum for each topic. For each topic, research relevant resources that would allow someone else to maximize their learning about that particular topic. Keep in mind that your resources will be potentially used by others in the class as they complete their Research Application in Interdisciplinary Studies assignment.

Note: When you post to each Blackboard forum, review what other students have already posted and try to post an alternative source. ***This assignment has a rolling due date: You will post the topic-specific reference according to the schedule listed in this syllabus.*** In other words, you will be posting different resources on different days/weeks. In the end, ***you will also submit one final list*** of the resources that you selected and posted. Please send to me via electronic attachment to suefleschner@twc.com, per the date on the schedule.

To earn credit for this assignment, please post the complete reference per the style guide suggestions you discovered in OWL. The goal is that any other student can use your direct resource for their Research Application in Interdisciplinary Studies assignment.

The topics include:

- Business Ethics
- Teamwork
- Managing Diversity
- Generational Differences
- Interpersonal Skills in the Workplace

- Managing Office Politics
- Achieving Career Success over a Lifetime

3. Applying Interdisciplinary Topics to Area of Focus – 100 points

You will select four of the topics from the Critical Analysis of Interdisciplinary Topics assignment. For each of the selected topics, you will identify one positive and one negative example of how you have experienced the respective topic in your own life. Your examples can be from personal, professional, service, church, etc., experience. Our goal is to hear specific examples. You will post your examples on Blackboard in a dedicated forum that will be available prior to the due date.

4. Research Application in Interdisciplinary Studies 100 points

You will select from one of the topics from the Critical Analysis of Interdisciplinary Topics assignment and complete a comprehensive research paper. For this assignment, you are encouraged to leverage the resources that are posted for the earlier Topics assignment; you can also include new, relevant resources, which meet guidelines established by OWL. You should have a minimum of five resources included on your reference page.

You will be graded on the overall interdisciplinary research and ideas that you present and support. Your final paper should be 5-7 pages with standard 1 inch margins, double-spaced, using a readable font such as Times New Roman 12 point font. You should use a consistent citation method such as APA, Chicago, or MLA depending on your background and preference and per your OWL learning.

5. Participation 100 points

Your participation in this class will primarily take the form of contributing to the discussions on Blackboard. I will track your involvement based upon the specific discussion questions, assignments, and announcements posted throughout the semester. Your participation should follow the Classroom Citizenship guidelines stated above. In addition, it is critical that you begin to practice professional electronic communication. ***Your contribution represents your personal and professional image. Please practice proper and conventional etiquette and grammar in all of your interactions during this course. Your grade will reflect this guideline.***

Grading Breakdown:

- The online classroom for us is primarily the Discussion Board (and other elements of communication we may use from time to time); this is where student participation and dialog take place. Discussion Boards are set up for each unit.
- Additionally I have set up several boards that are more social in nature so that we can continue to have a human element to our virtual classroom. For example, there will be a “Q&A Board” where you can post questions for the instructor or any other class member to respond to.
- At any time, you are free to correspond with me to ask any questions, raise concerns, etc. that you might have via email. Meetings can be arranged through blackboard’s virtual chat rooms, in my office, or via telephone as necessary. ***All email communications must be sent to suefleschner@twc.com.***
- Assignments should be submitted via email to suefleschner@twc.com. Assignments sent through blackboard or to my WKU address will not be graded. All assignments should be attached as an electronic file to the email. I will provide tracking edits to you and return, as appropriate and necessary.
- I will return all emails within 48 hours, excluding weekends, as long as they are sent to suefleschner@twc.com. ***I will not return emails if they do not follow proper and conventional etiquette and grammar guidelines.***
- I will attempt to return all assignments within one week of their due date (significant deviations will be conveyed to you via email or the announcement board on blackboard).
- I will on occasion contact students through the Blackboard email list. This list does use your WKU email address. I encourage you to either regularly check this account or have it forwarded to the address that you regularly use. Please also be aware of the limitations on your mailbox; if it is full, your message will bounce back to me and I will not have any way of conveying relevant course information to you.
- Whenever possible (with the exception of urgent announcements or individual messages) I post course information and announcements on the announcements page of blackboard; I suggest you read these announcements on a daily basis.
- Make up assignments (discussion boards, writing assignments, or exams) will not be permitted.
