#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This course is designed to provide an introduction to the skills and appropriate techniques of establishing positive relationships with families of young children and involving them in the early childhood program planning, implementation, and evaluation. Skills and techniques for building community partnerships and advocating for young children are addressed. Practical experiences provided in a field setting. Students are responsible for arranging their own field work and providing their own transportation.

- 5. Identify, select, and work with community agencies providing services to benefit young children, their families, and programs serving children (*6c*)

#### **CLASS POLICY STATEMENTS**

<u>Participation</u>: Students are expected to participate in all class discussions and exercises. It is the student's responsibility to contact the instructor if assignment deadlines are not met due to extenuating circumstances. Students are responsible for initiating arrangements for missed work.

<u>Late Assignments</u>: Late assignments will <u>not</u> be accepted, unless there are extenuating circumstances. Appropriate documentation will be required. Documentation must be provided within two weeks of extenuating circumstances. Routine medical appointments and court appearances (except jury duty) are not considered excusable absences. It is the responsibility of the student to contact the professor to resolve any missing work upon their return to class. In general, late assignments will have points deducted from the grade.

<u>Field Experience</u>: This course requires **6 hours of field experience** which serve the basis to write up family interview report, teacher interview report, and the community project report. Students are expected to identify and select parents, teachers, and programs/community agencies, as well as make arrangements for their visits. Students are responsible for their own transportation. **Failure to complete the fieldwork will result in a failing grade for the class.** An incomplete grade will <u>not</u> be given for failure to complete fieldwork required for final project. Some sites may require students to undergo criminal background checks, drug testing, a TB test, physical, or to provide proof of health insurance, liability insurance, and/or immunizations records prior to participating in any of the required experiences at selected off campus facilities/agencies. This is the student's responsibility. Students should check with their field site for the specific requirements of that site. Failure to complete these requirements for a field placement may result in delaying the field experience and possibly failing the course.

As policy, the College of Health and Human Services and the faculty will not keep this information on file. Students should keep a copy of all documentation for their files. If you are an education major, you should have a TB skin test, a physical and a criminal background check on file in the College of Education. If you are an out of state student doing your field hours outside of Kentucky, you should check to see what your state requires.

<u>Special Instructional Materials</u>: Students must have an active and valid email address for this class. Information may be sent to the entire class via email. Western Kentucky University provides an email address to every student. This is the official email address for all University information, including this class. Students will also need to have a current version (preferably 2013 or later version) of Microsoft Word. Blackboard does <u>not</u> recognize Notepad or Works. Blackboard will <u>not</u> open Word Perfect, Works, or Notepad.

<u>Plagiarism Policy</u>: To represent written work taken from another source as one's own is plagiarism. Plagiarism is a serious offense and is considered an act of Academic Dishonesty. The academic work of a student must be his or her own. One must give any author credit for source material borrowed from him or her. <u>Drop Policy</u>: Should the student decide to drop the class, it is their responsibility to do so. Failure to drop a class will result in a failing grade for that class.
