

## LITE 506 Organization of Information

### Course Description/Rationale:

This course will introduce students to the standards and resources for organizing information for school libraries. Topics covered include: organizing systems in libraries, subject analysis using Sears Subject Headings, the Dewey Decimal Classification system, descriptive cataloging for print and non print resources using Resource Description and Access (RDA) standards. The course will use the MARC record format to instruct students in cataloging school library materials. Curating information for virtual catalogs, Metadata issues, and the future of organization in libraries will also be discussed.

This course supports the conceptual framework of the School of Teacher Education. The overriding goals and objectives of the major unit are integrated into the program, course content, and assignments.

### Course Goal:

The students will develop the knowledge and skills to use organization principles to curate virtual resource collections in educational settings

The student will develop the knowledge and skills to use electronic cataloging programs and resources to create local catalog records, evaluate them for accuracy, and edit them to serve local library purposes.
