Grades received are the direct reflection of each student's work and study efforts. Extra credit for assignments will not be given to make up for poor performances on other assignments. The instructor's policy is that any extra credit given to one student must be given to all students. Each student is expected to prepare for every project, assignment, and examination as assigned.

Remediation of poor work is not an option during this class for points or grade, but may be obtained by repeating the course in future semesters.

Final course grades are determined by calculating the sum total of points earned for Assignments, Projects, Exams/Quizzes, Etc. and dividing that Total of Points Earned by Total Class Points to achieve a Grade Percentage (see below).

PURPOSE OF THESE ASSIGNMENTS: 1) To establish rapport / For me to get to know you and for you to get to know me and 2) to display critical thinking skills and utilize your resources to find information.

Everything you will need to complete these assignments can be found in the Pre-Class Course Materials Folder on BlackBoard and our Class Google Drive (which I will give you access to via a link and Google sharing).

Reading Reflections & Responses: 200 points (50 points * 4 Reflections/ Responses)

You will have required reading each week and will compete a Reading Reflection & Response prior to class. All assigned readings, podcasts, and other required learning materials and Reading Reflection & Response will be completed by the Monday prior to class not later than 12:00pm via online Message Board on Google Drive. Students will:

- **1.** Read the Assigned Readings, listen to podcasts, complete other required learning materials located in the syllabus.
- **2.** Write a Reflection Paragraph (No shorter than 10 sentences / No longer than 15 sentences) summarizing a learning, conclusion, take-home message, comment, and/or further questions from reading the chapters, listening to podcasts, and completing other required learning materials.
- **3.** Write a Response to someone's Reflection (No shorter than 10 sentences / No longer than 15 sentences) to comment, question and/or further discuss that person's Chapter reflection.
 - a. PLEASE NOTE THAT ONLY ONE RESPONSE CAN BE GIVEN PER REFLECTION (You must wait until a reflection is available to give a response).
 - b. Please note you will NOT receive credit for this assignment if you are don't post early enough to receive a response...that is you must discuss and cannot have a discussion with yourself.
 - c. DO YOUSELF A FAVOR AND DO NOT WAIT UNTIL THE LAST MINUTE TO POST A REFLECTION (THIS WILL HOLD OTHERS UP THAT ARE WAITING TO RESPOND).

In-Class Participation/After-Class Lecture Assignment: 400 points (100 points * 4 In-Class Participation/After-Class Lecture Assignment)

You will receive 400 points for In-Class participation and for completion of After-Class Lecture Assignments/Quiz. Each week on **Tuesday at 6:00pm** we will have an In-Class Lecture that students must be prepared for and fully engaged and actively engaged (e.g., answering questions when called upon and engaged in class discussions via chat message board). Directly after class, an "After-Class Assignment"/Quiz will be posted and *must be completed by the following Monday at 12pm*. You will be graded based on your class participation and the answers you provide to the Quiz questions in the "After-Class Lecture Assignment".

Medical SLP Interview Project: 300 points

DUE 7-7-2020 by 12pm

A rubric will be provided for this project.

This assignment MUST be audio-recorded and completed in-person or via Virtual meeting of Skype/Facetime/Zoom. This is not only an opportunity to gain information but also to network and meet with future colleagues in-person. Each student will be put in a groups of 5 and assigned a setting (i.e., Acute-care, Sub-acute care/In-patient Rehabilitation, Long-term acute-care, Skilled Nursing Facility, and Home-Health) SLP to interview. As a class, and with instructor input, we will devise a list of interview questions to be asked for this assignment. Interviews should be scheduled/conducted between 6-22-2020 and 6-28-2020.

To complete this assignment students will:

- 1) Seek out a Medical SLP interview candidate. SLP candidate <u>MUST</u> be Certified SLP (i.e., CCC-SLP; No CFY-SLP and No SLPAs) and <u>MUST</u> be servicing <u>ADULT</u> patients with with a wide range of diagnosis including but not limited to communication disorders, dysphagia, voice, cognitive communication, etc., for their caseload (i.e., NO SOLE cognitive SLPs, Voice SLPs, Dysphagia SLP or TBI SLPs, etc.). Confirm the candidate's scheduled interview date/time by **6-18-2020**. A place to list your confirmed, scheduled interview date/time is located on the Google Drive. Students can seek out interview candidates in their area by doing the following: a) asking local professors and SLP colleagues for recommendations, b) cold-calling individual facilities in your area, c) utilizing social media (e.g., facebook), d) other creative ideas for seeking interview candidates.
- 2) Between 6-22-2020 and 6-28-2020 conduct an in-person 30-minute interview, utilizing the <u>script/questions</u> devised by the class with the Medical SLP (must audio record and upload audio to the Google Drive by 6-29-2020). Make sure to thank the SLP for their time directly after the interview AND also follow-up with a thank you EMAIL (no text messages) with Dr. Fisher CC'ed on the email.
- 3) Listen to the other 4, 30-minute interviews of those in your group.
- 4) **DUE BY 7-7-2020: Write a 6-page,** Times New Roman-12 point font, 1.5-spaced, PDF saved narrative/overview of learnings from the interview inclusive of all 5 Medical SLP Levels following this order and format:

- a) Dedicate ¼ of a page as your Introduction
- b) Dedicate **1 page** giving an overview of your interview with your SLP (e.g., acute-care SLP). Make sure to include the SLP's name and SLP Setting.
- c) Dedicated **1 page** giving an overview of 2nd group members' interview (e.g.,sub-acute care/in-patient rehabilitation). Include SLP's name and SLP Setting.
- d) Dedicate **1 page** giving an overview of 3rd group members' interview (e.g., LTAC) Include SLPs name and SLP Setting.
- e) Dedicate **1 page** giving an overview of 4th group members' interview (e.g., SNF) Include SLPs name and SLP Setting.
- e) Dedicate **1 page** giving an overview of 5th group members' interview (e.g., Home-Health) Include SLPs name and SLP Setting.
- f) Dedicate your **final** ¾ of page with what you learned from the interviews of all 5 Medical SLPs, including comparing and contrasting answers given by SLPs depending on SLP setting (e.g., acute-care, sub-acute care/in-patient rehabilitation, LTAC, SNF, and Home-Health) and concluding by stating "how you will apply this information" in 1) graduate school and school clinical practicum and 2) as a future Speech Language Pathologist.

*You must follow all instructions and directions for this assignments. Not following instructions for this assignment WILL severely affect your grade.

*You are responsible for ensuring the correct setting for your SLP. Not following this instructions for this assignment WILL severely affect your grade.

Please check and verify the setting/category your SLP works in. Let the SLP know prior to the interview that this is a group project and you have been assigned to a specific setting (vs. other settings that your other group members are assigned to); therefore, they NEED/MUST speak from the perspective of that particular setting (and not other settings). I strongly urge you to check/double check and let the SLP know this before you interview. For example you can even say to the SLP: "Hey I'm in a group for a Medical SLP project and I have been assigned Sub-Acute Care/inpatient with Adults. My other group members have been assign to interview SLPs in the Acute Care, LTAC, SNF, and Home-Health settings with Adults. Because their interviews will address assessing/treating adult in those settings, my interview MUST come from the perspective of a Sub-Acute Care/Inpatient Rehab Medical SLP. Can you confirm that adult sub-acute care/inpatient Rehab is your setting and would you be able to do this interview from that perspective?"

*You are responsible for your audio/clarity of the audio and ensuring that other group members can access/understand/hear the audio. If your group members have any difficulty accessing/understanding/hearing your audio this will severely affect your grade.
