Student points from example: 300 / 390 = 76.92In this example, the letter grade "D" would be assigned.

If the final course average is 76.99%, the letter grade will be D. If the final course average is 83.99%, the letter grade will be C. If the final course average is 90.99%, the letter grade will be B. In other words, there will be no rounding of the final course average at the end of the semester.

Testing Policy & Procedures

Because Fundamentals class and lab/clinical are so closely related, and skills practiced in lab are an extension of what is taught in class, any information discussed or practiced in Nursing 334 (lab) will be testable on Nursing 333 (classroom) exams. Any test item format may be used including, but not limited to: multiple choice, multiple answer, hot spot, fill-in-the-blank, etc.

Make-Up Exams

A student should notify the course coordinator via email at least one hour prior to the exam that will be missed. Make up exams may consist of alternate format questions.

If an exam is missed because of an <u>extenuating circumstance</u> and documentation of that event can be provided to the course faculty, there will be no deduction in the exam score. Extenuating circumstances include a serious unforeseen accident, death or funeral of an immediate family member, or a contagious personal illness (ex: fever, vomiting, diarrhea, flu).

If an exam is missed because of a <u>non-emergent reason</u>, and the course coordinator is notified prior to the exam, there will be a deduction of the make-up exam score (up to 10%). Non-emergent reasons include (but are not limited to) vacations, weddings, routine medical and/or dental appointments, oversleeping, child care issues, heavy traffic, job interviews, or work scheduling.

If an exam is missed <u>without notifying the course coordinator</u> prior to the exam and/or the student cannot provide satisfactory justification (<u>non-extenuating circumstances and/or no-call no-show</u>), the make-up exam score will automatically be reduced by 10%.

Quizzes

No notes or books are allowed to be referenced during the quiz. Quizzes will be administered via Blackboard and require Respondus Lockdown Browser.
