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Expectations and Requirements

To pass the course, a student must have a final grade of 77. The student whose final average is 76.99 will receive a "D" for the course. This follows the WKU SON handbook policy (p. 12) https://www.wku.edu/handbook/academic-complaint.php

- 1. WKU SON has a **NO rounding policy** on all grades.
- 2. To receive a minimum requirement (passing score of 77), a student must have 385 total exam points (385/500 = 77). Quiz grades and PCA's (pre-class or post-class assignment) grades will not be added to the final score unless a minimum of 385 exam points has been attained.
- 3. When student reaches the minimum requirement 385/500 exam points, (Quiz grades and/or PCA grades will be added to the final score).
 - a. To pass N341, the student must achieve a total of 446.6 points (out of 500 possible exam points and 80 possible quiz and/or pre-class assignment points). Example: 446.6/580 = 77. (See Grading Scale on p. 7 of this document)

Students are evaluated on the number of points obtained within a given course. The points are changed to a letter grade based on the number of points obtained within the class (see class syllabi for details). Didactic and clinical courses for a topic area (e.g. Fundamentals of Nursing) must be taken concurrently. Students must successfully pass the didactic and clinical portions of the course simultaneously or both must be repeated.

Faculty may require APA format for written assignments. APA resources are available on the SON webpage and on the student organizational sites on Blackboard; however, they are not a substitution for the APA Manual required for some nursing courses.

- 2. All students will be expected to have a personal electronic device as designated by the School of Nursing for exams. All devices used must have the minimum system requirements as set by the School of Nursing (see below). Students will need to have access to a good internet connection to download exams prior to the exam start time and upload exams immediately after completion. Notice: The School of Nursing and Allied Health may require the students to be monitored during exams. Students will need to have access to a second device with a camera to use for monitoring purposes during exams if required.

- 4. All students must have Examsoft/Examplify App downloaded onto their personal electronic testing device (iPad) prior to the first exam.
- 5. All students should download their scheduled exams to Examplify on their iPad at least 24 hours prior to the scheduled exam administration date and time. Students will need internet access to download the exam. All exams will be available for download at least 48 hours prior to exam administration to allow adequate time for student downloads. Students should contact ExamSoft directly for problems downloading Examplify or any exam. See contact information above (3.g.)
- 6. A student arriving for an exam without the testing software and their schedule exam downloaded to their personal electronic device may receive a 10% exam deduction and may be required to schedule a make-up exam for an alternate date.
- 7. A student who scores less than 77% on any exam or has other deficiencies such as incomplete assignments before the drop date (November 2, 2020) should make an appointment with their faculty mentor for an academic conference.
- 8. Students will have 65 minutes to complete each unit exam. Students will have 120 minutes to complete the comprehensive final exam.
- 9. Exam scores will be available on Blackboard within the week after each examination is complete. Faculty will review item statistics and make decisions on any changes to exam grades based on those statistics prior to opening grades in Blackboard.
- 10. If a student is unable to attend a scheduled examination, the student must notify their faculty mentor prior to the start of the examination. It is the student's responsibility to contact the faculty mentor to schedule a make-up examination. A student who does not notify the faculty mentor of an absence prior to an examination and/or who cannot provide satisfactory justification for the absence will have their exam grade on a makeup examination reduced by 10% of the total possible points.
- 11. Make-up examinations must be completed within one week of the original test date unless there are extenuating circumstances. Notice: A make-up examination may contain items of different formats than the original exam. Examinations that are not made up within one week of the

original test date will have the total possible exam points reduced by an additional 10% per week. Example: student makes a grade of 84 on the make-up exam, 1-week overdue with 10% reduction, student would receive = 75.6; 2-week overdue with 20% reduction, student would receive = 67.2

- 12. After one week following the exam, no further test review for that unit exam will be allowed and no further adjustment of grades will be made. If students have concerns regarding a test item, they may submit written documentation from their textbook and/or notes to their faculty mentor or to the course coordinator (Dr. Neena Jones) regarding the question within one week of seeing their test feedback. Students are not to take photographs, make written notes, or record/save exam questions, or take screen shots of their missed exam questions. Faculty can see missed test questions in the test shell and will use the shell when reviewing your answers.
- 13. The final exam will not be reviewed with students who pass the N341 course.
- 14. Once the course final grades are calculated and posted on TopNet, no additional test review will be considered.
- 15. Faculty reserve the right to make changes to the number of items on exams or exam format as needed and students will be notified of changes in writing. This course utilizes web-based testing and technological issues could arise that either delay or prevent retrieval of student test results. Therefore, faculty reserve the right to add additional test questions to a future exam, increase the point value of future exam questions, or require retesting, as necessary.

Final Grades and Time of Posting

To avoid possible disruptions of students who have finals scheduled for later during finals week, no exam grades, clinical skills performance results or other grades will be made available to students during finals week. All final exam grades and results of skills checkoffs will be held in confidence by faculty until the Monday following finals week. Letter grades will be posted on TopNet by faculty between 8am-noon on Monday after finals week. Graduating students are exempt from this policy.

Meeting with the Faculty, Program Coordinator or Director of the School of Nursing

While any student can make an appointment to meet with the course faculty, the Program Coordinator or the Director of the School of Nursing about their grades and the grading process, this does not constitute a grade appeal and will not result in a change of grade after the final grade has been reviewed by the faculty member and posted on TopNet.

The faculty member is considered the expert and the faculty members option of the correct answer will be the final answer.

Instructional Methods

Instructional methods will include, but are not limited to, lecture, assigned readings, discussion boards, group process, case study, HESI case study, role-play, gaming, videos, simulation, in-class quizzing, BlackBoard Quizzes, pre-class and/or post-class assignments, as well as self-directed learning activities. Audiovisual material will be used when appropriate. Students may have assigned readings, designated pre-class/post-class assignments, and are expected to come to class prepared for the content being discussed.

Classroom Attendance:

Nursing is a pre-professional program of study and students are expected to be punctual and attentive in the classroom (whether face-to-face or live ZOOM sessions).

Professionalism/Participation
