# SPRING SEMESTER 2021 Dr. Margaret E. Crowder

## **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

Introduction to how normal Earth processes concentrate their energies to create devastating impacts. Students will understand the physical processes behind and the spatial dimension of Earth's natural hazards and disasters with a special emphasis on surviving them. These disasters include tectonic, oceanic, and atmospheric hazards. The semester will include a discussion of how climate change may affect the risk and severity of some of these hazards. *Colonnade Program requirements:* GEOG 226 satisfies WKU's Colonnade Program's requirements for the Connection-Systems (K-SY) category. To receive Colonnade credit, you must have 21 hours of Foundations and/or Explorations courses, or junior status. You cannot have taken a previous Connections course in the GEOG discipline and still receive Colonnade credit for this course.

<u>Colonnade Learning Objectives:</u> This course fulfills Colonnade Program's Systems category learning objectives. Students in this course will:

- 1. analyze how systems evolve.
- 2. compare the study of individual components to the analysis of entire systems.
- 3. evaluate how system-level thinking informs decision-making, public policy, and/or the sustainability of the system itself.

# **LEARNING and CONTENT OBJECTIVES**

The learning and content objectives for GEOG 226 are designed to fully integrate fully with the Colonnade Program. Upon successfully completing this course, students will be able to:

- 1. gain an understanding of the geologic and atmospheric processes responsible for natural hazards, including earthquakes, volcanic eruptions, landslides, flooding, tornadoes, hurricanes, drought, and asteroid impacts
- 2. gain an understanding of the geographic distribution of natural hazards and the frequency which these hazards become natural disasters
- 3. gain an understanding of how society evaluates and confronts the dangers posed by these natural processes from a political, social, and ethical perspective
- 4. gain an understanding of how technological innovations allow an increasing human population to monitor, predict, and warn society about natural hazards and impending disasters

Absences refer to total number of unexcused absences. It is your responsibility to keep track of the number of your class absences! **FYI:** An "A" requires *extra effort* and to earn one is a great honor. Doing the bare minimum will not result in an "A." Students who earn "A's" are attentive, never (or very rarely) miss class, are prepared for the lecture, score the highest on exams, are leaders in discussions, and put extra effort into their assignments. Do not underestimate the amount of time you will need to devote to studying for this class. Just because it is a 100-level course, does not mean it is easy.

**Nature of the Exams and Quizzes:** Exam questions may consist of a combination of multiple choice, matching, fill-in-the-blank, short answer and drawing questions. These questions will come primarily from the lecture and the textbook, but may also come from any supplemental materials posted on Blackboard or shown during class. Additionally, there will be quizzes given over the course of the semester - generally once a week other than weeks with exams scheduled. Quizzes will be online and must be completed within the times and days indicated for the

assignment on Blackboard. Dates of Exams are SET, please make note of them. Exams will be available online for limited periods of time and must be completed within the range of times indicated.

Make-up Policy: Exams will generally not be given after the day they are scheduled, nor will assignments be accepted late. In other words, only under exceptional circumstances will there be any "make-up" opportunities for missed exams and assignments.
