Course Description:

A general study of the various forms of dance with emphasis on the contributions each has made to the performing arts and the development of our culture. A course in dance appreciation covering aspects of various theatrical dance styles. Dance Appreciation is a broad overview of the art form. Topics include the origin and evolution of major genres of western concert dance, aspects of dance as cultural, political, spiritual, and aesthetic forms of expression, and the study of the related roles of the dancer, choreographer, and spectator.

Course Goals:

- To provide an abbreviated history of western theatrical dance forms
- To introduce elements involved in the production of western theatrical dance
- To examine various careers in the field of dance
- To explore aspects of dance as cultural, political, spiritual, and aesthetic forms of expression
- To encourage critical thinking and analysis of dance
- To make dance more accessible

Learning Outcomes:

Students will be able to:

- Demonstrate knowledge of essential elements, concepts, vocabulary, and major figures and styles significant to the discipline of dance
- Analyze how social, cultural, and historical contexts influence creative expression
- Evaluate the significance of human expression and experience in shaping larger social, cultural, and historical contexts.
- Critically analyze dance works from a variety of genres

Course Requirements:

The web course is presented through written lectures, course readings, videos, class discussions, and activities.

Required Text:

Dance Appreciation by Amanda Clark and Sara Pecina

(Yes, you will need to purchase this book- it can be a print (new or used) or e-book version. You must have this book by the start of the second week of classes, and we will use it throughout the semester.)

Assignments/Discussions (25%):

Assignments/Discussions related to lectures, course readings and video viewings will be assigned regularly throughout the semester. Refer to weekly modules for descriptions, grading criteria and deadlines.

Quizzes (15%):

Quizzes will consist of multiple-choice, true-false, matching, and short answer questions related to lecture topics, course readings, and course videos.

Unit Exams (30%):

Three unit exams will be given throughout the semester. Unit exams will consist of multiple-choice, true/false, matching, and short answer/essay questions. Exams will cover topics from course lectures, readings, and videos.

End of Unit Projects/Papers (30%):

Three end of unit projects and papers will be assigned throughout the semester. Unit 1: Group Project, Unit 2: Choreographer Project, Unit 3: Dance Critique Paper More information will be posted on Blackboard.
