Course Description

This is an upper division course covering broad topics and regions in the **geography of East Asia**. The course introduces major sub-disciplines of geomorphology, climatology, demographics, agriculture, industry, economics, social issues, politics, languages, religions, and other pertinent fields in **East Asia**. Students need to understand that each of the sub-disciplines could be an individual course, depending on the depth of the contents. Students should not only understand the general characteristics and phenomena related to the contents from these sub-disciplines, but also need to analyze why certain phenomena take place in certain places. The goal of the course is to help students **synthesize WHAT**, **WHERE**, **WHEN**, **HOW**, and **WHY** geographic elements help shape the physical, economic, social, and environmental characteristics and patterns of East Asia and its surrounding areas. The course emphasizes both physical and human geography and their close relationships. But more attention will be given to human geography, and how the diverse economic, cultural, religious, and ethnic elements help form the increasingly important role of East Asia in the world. Lastly after the introduction, the course focuses **more** on **Mainland China**, the most populous country and 2nd largest economy in the world, than other East Asian counties.

Course Objective

At the completion of this course, students should be able to:

- Obtain general geographic knowledge about East Asia, especially Mainland China
- Know geographic locations of major countries, territories, regions, and cities, and can identify them on a map
- Obtain basic knowledge of physical geography and human geography of the area
- Fairly and objectively analyze social issues related to women, children, urbanization, religion, human rights, inequality, and poverty
- Understand the plural political issues in the area and how they are interrelated to the rest world
- Appreciate the diverse cultural assets of the area, especially in Mainland China
- Understand economic strengths, opportunities, and challenges facing the area, especially Mainland China

- Establish views of sustainable development to deal with the conflicts between development, social justice, politics, and environment in East Asia
- Know to how use and create interactive web maps (e.g. Google Map, Google Earth, Baidu Map) effectively as a major research tool in data gathering, data analysis, and information dissemination

Class Website

This class uses e-course delivery at WKU Blackboard to enhance the online learning experience of students. The class website contains lecture PPTs, exercises, assignments, other materials related to the course, student grades as a way to monitor progress in the class, and other pertinent information. *Students are expected to check* <u>http://ecourses.wku.edu</u> weekly to study new class materials & exercise/assignment instructions and submit electronically exercises and assignments.

Web Attendance Policy

Poor attendance reflects a poor scholastic attitude. Students must study class materials and work on exercises and assignments weekly. It is students' responsibility to visit the class website weekly and maintain an excellent virtual attendance and class participation record. It is also the students' responsibility to communicate regularly with the professor about the progress of the class as well as exercises and assignments. During the scheduled class meeting times, that is, TR 11:10am – 12:30pm, students should be expected to attend Zoom meetings from time to time for important discussions, Q/A, assignment demos, student presentations, etc.

Students should attend scheduled Zoom meetings as expected, and actively participate in class discussions. In addition, students will learn some basic mapping tools and skills to study geography of East Asia by using three Web GIS/mapping software, namely, Google Map, Google Earth, and potentially Baidu Map (if you are proficient in Chinese) via completing several mapping exercises and one Google Earth project. In Google Earth Project, two students will form a group and each group will work on a project to develop a tour-based presentation in Google Earth to present basic geography, tourist attractions, things to do, events, activities, etc. in a region (particularly in Mainland China) or a country assigned to each group. In this assignment, students will use Internet and web mapping software to gather data, create interactive web maps, and prepare the presentation in form of custom Google map and Google Earth Project.

Each <u>quiz</u> may include map tests and/or multiple-choice questions. Quizzes are open book but timed. Each student will need to prepare and give <u>a short presentation</u> (5-10 minutes) to share a piece of trending news from East Asia and discuss it from geographic perspective (e.g. Five Themes of Geography and how it relates to the main topics of our class). Each <u>individual essay assignment</u> may include a combination of short answer questions, short essays, movie/documentary review, and/or other related formats. Lastly, in <u>Presentation Assignment</u>, each student will prepare a 25~30-minute power point presentation (in **Power Point** file format, **Microsoft Windows**). Specifically, you will decide a county or a place and then choose a topic of relevance to the class that you wish to

investigate in-depth. A power point presentation must be prepared independently by each student at the time to be determined by the selected location and topic.
