- 3. Demonstrate how social, cultural, and historical contexts influence creative expression in the Arts and Humanities.
- 4. Evaluate the significance of human expression and experience in shaping larger social, cultural, and historical contexts.
- 5. Evaluate enduring and contemporary issues of human experience.
- 6. Read, comprehend, and analyze primary texts independently and proficiently.

<u>Course Goals:</u> In MLNG 200, students will learn to: extend the skills of expository writing established in English 100 or equivalent; read, appreciate, and interpret fiction, drama, and poetry, and write analytically about them; understand literary principles and use basic terms important to critical writing and reading; and document essays using textual evidence.

Note: If, for any reason, class does not meet, you are still responsible for all readings and other homework listed on the syllabus as if class had met.

Please note also that this syllabus provides a general plan for the course; changes may be necessary.

#### **Grading System:**

- Reading Quizzes (15%): The aim of the reading quizzes is to check if you have previewed the readings prior to class. The quizzes (multiple-choice and/or True/False questions) are short and should not take more than 8 minutes to complete. We will use the first 8 minutes of the class period for the quiz. If you arrive late, you won't have additional time to complete the quiz. You may be allowed to make up quizzes that you miss with valid excusals. These must be done the next class period. After that, the grade will automatically be zero and cannot be changed.
- <u>Homework assignments (10%)</u>: There will be four homework assignments. The assignments, mostly one page, are your reflections on an article, a movie, or a video. They are due before the class starts.
- <u>Final Paper Project (15%)</u>: The final paper project is composed of three elements—proposal (3%), final paper presentation (2%), and final paper (10%).
- <u>Presentations (20%)</u>: Each student will give two presentations throughout the semester. Presentations should be at least 15-minute long with the presenters leading a discussion with the class. Please have your PPT slides ready before the start of the class.
- Literary/Linguistic Analysis Essays (10%): There will be two literary/linguistic analysis essays.
- Exams (20%): There will be two exams to check your understandings of the literary work we have discussed in class. The question types include true/false, multiple choices, and short answers.
- Participation & Attendance (10%): Regular attendance is necessary for your progress and in maintaining a constructive environment for learning. Without documentation, absences are not excused. These must be both valid and verifiable (i.e.: doctor's excusal, field trip authorization, military orders). You will lose 2% of the participation and attendance grade for each unexcused absence. Your grade for the class period is based on the time present in class.

We do not conduct class in the bathroom or the hallway. University policy also requires any student with excessive absences to be referred to Academic Advising.
