### **Child Maltreatment:**

Required Course for the Public Child Welfare Certification Program (PCWCP).

# **Course Description:**

This course is designed to provide a comprehensive introduction to child abuse and neglect from a social work perspective. Social workers in all professional work settings must know how to identify child maltreatment and domestic violence. Students will learn the family dynamics and indicators of maltreatment and effective interventions on the micro and macro level. Additionally, students will learn the extent of the problem, effects on children, treatment issues, the social worker's roles in a multidisciplinary team approach, and how to advocate for individuals and families.

This course is the first of two specific course requirements for the child welfare certification available through Western Kentucky University and the Department for Community Based Services.

## The Generalist Perspective:

The practice of social work requires that a practitioner be prepared to intervene in a range of different settings with client systems of any size. There is a common body of knowledge, values, and skills used;

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there is recognition often the most effective occurs when a professional address a problem during private and public levels.

# **Course Objectives**

During this course, students will be able to:

- Summarize the causes and effects of violence on the micro and macro levels.
- Outline the indicators and family dynamics of child neglect, physical abuse, sexual abuse, and emotional maltreatment.
- Identify and describe the interaction between individual development stages and family developmental stages.
- Utilize the principles of empowerment and strengths perspective as well as systems framework to understand how individuals in families communicate and develop.
- Explain the indicators and relationship dynamics of domestic violence as it relates to child abuse and neglect.
- Discuss and explain reporting requirements for child abuse/neglect, spouse/partner abuse, and how to make such abuse/neglect reports.
- Explain the roles of primary professionals involved with domestic violence cases and summarize the effectiveness of the multidisciplinary approach.
- Diagram the present structure of the Public Child Welfare System and its relationship with other community partners.
- Gain knowledge of society's response to child/spouse maltreatment including current legislation.
- Describe systems issues contributing to violence and barriers impeding protection of victims.
- Identify the social worker's intervention roles and responsibilities in abuse/neglect situations.
- Explain the most effective treatment modalities for intervening in Child Protective Services (CPS) abuse and neglect in addition to domestic violence situations.
- Explain the principles to advocacy for children and families.
- Restate the roles and functions of the multi-partners needed in the collaborative process necessary for the continuum of care provided to families.
- Demonstrate the potential impact of cultural and ethic background as it applies to family function and system response.

#### **Educational Outcomes**

After the first section of this course, students should be able to:

- List at least five indicators of child abuse/neglect and five indicators of domestic violence.
- Identify when it is appropriate to make a referral of child or adult maltreatment in addition to the appropriate steps to creating a referral.
- Summarize current legal responsibilities of the social worker in domestic violence and child maltreatment cases.

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- List and describe at least five resources and community partners available to assist children and abused women.
- Case plan and class advocacy strategies on behalf of maltreated children and adult victims of abuse.
- Identify strengths and weaknesses of the Kentucky Child Welfare System.
- Differentiate between at least three cultural practices and child maltreatment.
- Identify family dynamics, strengths, and needs with cultural sensitivity.

## **Course Expectations**

- Students are expected to come to class prepared with readings and assignments completed when due and enter class discussions appropriately. <u>Points will be deducted for late</u> assignments.
- Students are expected to be timely to all classes.
- The written assignments should be typed using proper documentation in APA format. The complete reference for the APA Style Manual is listed in Suggested Readings.

# **Teaching Methods**

Course delivery will be Bowling Green campus face-to-face, Elizabethtown campus will be via Zoom, and we will use a web-bases system of Moodle. Teaching methods will include lectures, guest speakers, videos, large and small group discussion, and readings. All class material and assessments are located on EKU's Moodle site.


#### Steps to create an account and gain course access:

- 1. In either Google Chrome or Mozilla Firefox, navigate to https://train.trc.eku.edu/pcwcp
- 2. Read all instructions and watch the account creation tutorial!
- 3. Fill out all fields completely.
  - a. Your username should be all lowercase letters in the format of "cwfirstname.lastname." For instance my name is Monica Hines so my username would be "cwmonica.hines" (If it is not formatted correctly, the system will reject it).
  - b. Do not create multiple accounts.
  - c. It could take up to 15 minutes to receive your temporary password.
  - d. If you received an email welcoming you to the PCWCP program with instructions on a TRIS account creation, you do not need to create a new account proceed to step 4!
  - e. Use you University email address.
- 4. You will receive (2) separate emails. The first email will confirm your account creation and the second email will provide you with your username and a temporary password to use when you log into Moodle for the first time.

- 5. When you receive the second email (you will only receive an email if you have created an account in steps 1-3) navigate to the course by entering <a href="https://learn.trc.eku.edu/moodle/course/view.php?id=638">https://learn.trc.eku.edu/moodle/course/view.php?id=638</a>n your web browser. If you already have a TRIS account, simply navigate to the link.
- 6. You will first be prompted to create a new password (only if you are creating an account for the first time).
- 7. You will then be prompted to enter your enrollment key. Your key is WKUFall21#. This key must be entered exactly as written, including case sensitivity and special characters.
- 8. You will then be redirected to the course.
- 9. The next time you log in you can simply go to <a href="https://learn.trc.eku.edu/moodle">https://learn.trc.eku.edu/moodle</a> and the course will be in your dashboard.

# Council on Social Work Education (CSWE) Definition of Generalist Practice and Required Core Competencies for BSW Education

The Council on Social Work Education defines Generalist Practice as the following:

Generalist practice is grounded in the liberal arts and the person-in-environment framework. To promote human and social well-being, generalist practitioners use a range of prevention and intervention methods in their practice with individuals, families, groups, organizations, and communities based on scientific inquiry and best practices. The generalist practitioner identifies with the social work profession and applies ethical principles and critical thinking in practice at the micro, mezzo, and macro levels. Generalist practitioners engage diversity in their practice and advocate for human rights and social and economic justice. They recognize, support and build on the strengths and resiliency of all human beings. They engage in research-informed practice and are proactive in responding to the impact of context on professional practice. The

baccalaureate program in social work prepares students for generalist practice. The descriptions of the nine Social Work Competencies presented in the EPAS identify the knowledge, values, skills, cognitive and affective processes, and behaviors associated with competence at the generalist level of practice (EPAS, 2015, p. 11).
