COURSE DESCRIPTION: Introduce and provide students with the background necessary to develop a funding proposal. The grant writing process and how to manage the award will be explored.

COURSE OBJECTIVES/OUTCOMES:

- · Create a grant application
- Conduct a search for funding sources
- Recognize the general characteristics of a winning grant proposal
- Write for a competitive grant proposal
- Prepare a budget appropriate for supporting a project
- Demonstrate an understanding of how to successfully manage a grant award
