

**Nursing 510**  
**Graduate Nursing Research**  
**Spring 2022**

**Course Description:** This course is designed to increase excitement about nursing research and facilitate the search for knowledge through research. A strong conceptual framework linking research with practice, theory, knowledge, and philosophy will be stressed.

**Course Credit:** 3 hours

**Prerequisite(s):** Admission to the graduate nursing program. Graduate level statistics either prior to or concurrent. In order to complete the course requirements for this course, students are required to have completed Nursing 504 prior to enrollment.

**Objectives:** At the completion of the course, the student will be able to:

1. Analyze major concepts of nursing research and the research process.
2. Synthesize prior learning and practice to identify nursing problems for study.
3. Conduct research critiques of quantitative and qualitative nursing studies.
4. Evaluate reported research for practice implications.

Articles will be assigned throughout the course.

**Research Tool:** Nursing 510 is the designated research tool for the graduate nursing program. Therefore, a minimum grade of "B" must be attained for the course (see MSN or DNP student handbook). If a "C" or less is attained, the student must repeat the course. You may repeat the course only one time. Failure to earn a "B" on a second occurrence results in dismissal from the nursing program. All assignments must be completed and submitted to pass the course.

**Instructional Methods:** This course is taught online using Blackboard as the delivery format. Instructional methods will include a variety of teaching strategies to meet the needs of students with various learning styles. During the course, you will be listening to lectures, reading various material, viewing video clips, participating in group discussions, and other activities. To measure knowledge, you will be completing quizzes, exams, discussion boards, research application assignments, review of literature, and a mini research proposal.

**Evaluation Methods:** Assignments will provide students the opportunity to apply knowledge and demonstrate meeting course objectives. All written assignments, unless otherwise noted, should conform to APA guidelines.

**Final Examination:** There will be a comprehensive final examination.

**Student Papers:** Specific information about each paper/assignment will be posted on blackboard.

**Student Etiquette/Social Environment:** If you are participating in online discussions in this course, it is expected that in addition to following guidelines on rubrics, you will be respectful of

your peers. You may pose questions and/or challenge a view of a classmate, but this must be done in a professional manner.

Challenges must be made in writing and based on material they can reference in their textbook or notes. In addition, the student must question specific assignment items.
