# ECON 375—MORAL ISSUES OF CAPITALISM Western Kentucky University Syllabus

**COURSE DESCRIPTION**: This course is designed to help students think about moral issues that come up in economic systems. We will work through those issues in an analytical way, drawing tools from a range of fields to craft moral arguments—conclusions supported by premises—dealing with issues that come up in the modern economy. We will look at topics in the realms of healthcare, jobs, the environment, and inequality.

**PRE-REQUISITES:** ECON 150, ECON 202, or ECON 203. Special permission by the instructor may also be given for students with appropriate backgrounds and training.

**MATERIALS**: We will be using the textbook *Doing Ethics: Moral Reasoning, Theory, and Contemporary Issues*, 6th ed. by Lewis Vaughn. All other articles for this course will be posted on Blackboard.

**OTHER MATERIALS**: Recorded lectures, assignments, discussion boards, and other course materials will be posted on Blackboard, which will play an especially large role given the online format of the course. I encourage you to check the Blackboard site regularly. You may also want to change your default settings to receive email notifications whenever there is an update to the course.

**GRADING**: Final grades for the course will be based on: participation in discussion boards (20%) weekly assignments (40%) and a final paper (40%). Grades are set on a standard 100-point scale with:

A: 90% to 100%; B: 80% to 89%; C: 70% to 79%; D: 60% to 69%; F: below 60%.

**FINAL PAPER**: The final paper for this course will be on a topic of your choosing, with a list of suggested topics posted on Blackboard. I encourage you to pick a topic that you are really interested in—if it's not on the suggested topics list, email me and I will confirm that it has an appropriate scope for this writing task. A more detailed description of the requirements will be posted on Blackboard, but in general this is a chance for you to show that you can apply what we've learned in the course in a 5 to 8 page paper. The final paper will be due **Friday, June 10**.
