COURSE: SOCL 240: GLOBAL SOCIAL PROBLEMS

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course presents a critical examination of social problems in different parts of the world within the context of a globalizing world. You will be exposed to the basic ways that sociologists use to analyze the social world known as the Sociological Imagination. Topics covered in this course will include but are not limited to the following social issues: Inequality, war, population, urbanization, health, ecology, terrorism, crime and energy. At the end of the course, you will understand the interrelatedness of the causes of these problems from an internal perspective, which examines forces operating within a community/country and an external view that consider factors operating at the global level.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

By the end of this course you should:

- 1. Explain how sociologists approach the study of global social problems.
- 2. Identify how social problems in our society (and others) are connected to larger global issues.
- 3. Apply sociological theories that vary in how they define the source of the underlying problem, including the structural functionalist perspective and the conflict perspective.
- 4. Critically evaluate current interventions and proposed solutions to specific global social problems and assess the consequences for various actors at the local and global levels.

TEACHING METHODS:

- 1. <u>Lectures</u>: PowerPoint's slides are provided to guide you as you go through the book chapters.
- 2. Review guides are also provided with practice questions to help you prepare for the exams. I will not provide the answers to practice questions because they are supposed to help you study.

Exams: You will have a total of THREE tests in the course. Exams will be completed using the testing capabilities of the Blackboard learning management system and will consist of 40 multiple-choice questions. Exams will be timed for 50 minutes and are scored immediately upon completion – no waiting in suspense to see how well you did. Considering that this is a three-week class, you should expect to digest a lot of information within a short time. You will be examined after every four chapters. To be clear, Test 1 will cover materials from Chapters 1-4; Test 2 will cover materials from Chapters 5-8; Test 3 will cover materials from Chapters 9-12. See the schedule below for details. Be sure to master the material before taking the test.

Respondus Lockdown Browser and Respondus Monitor

You must use a special Internet Browser called Respondus Lockdown Browser to take the exams. For the first test, you will be required to use both Respondus Lockdown and Respondus monitor to take the test. The rest of the tests you only need the Lockdown browser. Remember you CANNOT use Explorer, Firefox, Safari or Google Chrome to open the tests. If you do so, you will be prompted for a password that does not exist. In fact, if for some reason you are asked for a password know that you have made a mistake. ONLY Respondus Lockdown Brower has access to the tests on Blackboard.
