COURSE DESCRIPTION AND PREREQUISITES

A general course in developmental psychology covering the entire life span. Included are a description of growth stages, theories of development, and research methods of development. **Colonnade E-SB** (3 hours).

COLONNADE PROGRAM

- applies theories and research on human development to issues of personal concern and public interest

The general education goals will be assessed with extra credit multiple choice questions on the final exam.

COURSE STRUCTURE: This course is structured in units. The week begins at 12:00 AM the first date listed and ends at 11:59 PM on the second date listed. Each unit will contain a lecture videos per chapter, a quiz per chapter, an assignment per chapter, and cumulative test for the unit. The PowerPoints used in the lecture videos will also be posted. Online courses are required to have the same amount of time put into them as a traditional course. Assignments, quizzes, and tests may cover any information in the chapter, whether I cover it or not.

EVALUATION AND GRADING

SYLLABUS QUIZ: During the first week of class, you are required to complete a verification assignment to verify your attendance. This will be a quiz on the syllabus. This must be completed by 11:59 pm on Sunday, August 28th. This is worth 50 points.

EXAMS: There will be 2 exams over the course of the semester, a mid-term and a final. Material will come from the weekly quizzes. Each exam will be worth 100 points, for a total of 200 points.

QUIZZES: There will be a quiz each on every chapter of the text we cover in class. Each quiz is worth 10 points, for a total of 130 points.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS: Every week there will be a discussion question related to that week's lecture and reading. You are required to provide a response to the week's discussion question. **Responses should be 2-3 paragraphs long, with each paragraph being a minimum of 4 sentences. A post that is only a few sentences long will not receive credit.** Each week's may DQ has multiple questions. **If you do not respond to all questions in each DQ, you will not receive credit.** Each discussion question is worth 40 points, for a total of 520 points.

PAPER: There will be 1 paper required during this course. This paper will explore topics related to death and grieving. The paper is worth 100 points.

For your paper, you will be considering information you have learned about development and aging to address several questions. You only need to use your book as a reference, but do NOT copy straight from your book. That is plagiarism! Read through the topic in your book, then discuss the points in your own words.

The following are the questions you should address in your paper. You will be including your opinion, but you need to support your opinion with developmental facts and information.

- Do you think people who are going to die should be told? Does your response depend on the person's age?
- How do people exercise some control over the place and manner in which they die?
- Do you think assisted suicide should be permissible? Other forms of euthanasia? Why or why not?

The paper should be 2-3 pages, typed and double spaced. Use Times New Roman, 12 pt font, 1" margins. No title page is necessary, but a reference page is required. Remember that you should have opening and concluding paragraphs, as well as transitions. This paper will be graded on content as well as structure and grammar.

The paper is due Sunday, December 4th by 11:59 pm on Blackboard. Please email me with any questions you may have.
