- use appropriate vocabulary for the description and critical analysis of dramatic and theatrical works, as well as identify the major elements, approaches and terminology used in contemporary theatrical practice.
- demonstrate the ability to analyze dramatic literature on the page and/or in performance for theme, genre, and dramatic structure, as well as to evaluate the appropriateness and artistic validity of production choices made by theatre artists in various cultural, political, aesthetic and social contexts.
- analyze how social, cultural and historical contexts have influenced theatrical literature, practices and performance in various cultures and time periods.
- explore how theatre and theatre artists have challenged, supported or shaped social values, political systems and aesthetic practices in various cultures and time periods

• identify common themes, ideas and artistic approaches in theatre from a range of periods and cultures, and examine how these issues as well as newer concerns are currently being addressed by attending and analyzing live theatrical performances.
