GENERAL INFORMATION

DESCRIPTION

A senior capstone experience synthesizing and assessing the complete field of study for film majors. Emphasis on independent development and discussion. Includes an exploration of career and graduate study opportunities as well as intensive research and analysis into the present and future states of filmmaking.

OBJECTIVES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

Course Objectives: By course end, the well-disciplined student will be able to:

- Demonstrate awareness of key issues in the current film industry and their chosen field of interest.
- Effectively summarize stories and their own comments for coverage and pitches.
- Interact with professionals from WKU Film's alumni network as well as others in their field of interest.
- Market themselves as professionals or potential graduate students with a comprehensive portfolio.

Student Responsibilities: Students will be expected to spend time outside of class reading, writing, and preparing assignments and projects. Readings and assignments must be completed in a timely manner. Late work WILL NOT be accepted. Because of the participatory nature of the class, students are expected to be on time and ready to engage in discussion (see: Participation/Discussion below). <u>Additionally, due to the virtual nature of the class,</u> students are expected to have their webcams active at all times.

EVALUATION

Several methods will be used throughout the course to determine your final grade. More detailed explanations of the specific assignments will be given at the appropriate time.

PARTICIPATION/DISCUSSION

This course will involve discussions on topics from the assigned readings and/or current events. These discussions will extend beyond class time for those with more specific questions and tie back into future classes. In order to adequately prepare for guest interviews, students may be expected to provide a written question in advance for consideration. These should be questions that spark conversation, not simple yes or no questions. Be prepared to actively participate in discussions. If I don't hear your voice, then you aren't participating.

INDUSTRY TRADES

In order to aid your understanding of the film industry, it is imperative you keep up with the latest industry news/trends. Students will be expected to read industry trades, such as The Hollywood Reporter, Variety, and Deadline, as well as trades, sites, or podcasts specific to their chosen field of interest, such as American Cinematographer (for DPs), Scriptnotes podcast (for writers), DGA Quarterly (for directors), etc.

INDUSTRY SKILLS

Students will complete assignments to prepare for aspects of the film and television industry:

- 1) Script Coverage (for feature-length film, one-hour TV drama, and half-hour TV comedy)
- 2) Knowledge of Los Angeles, New York, or Atlanta
- 3) Alumni Interview (informational Q&A session with a WKU Film alum)

FINAL PORTFOLIO

In order to prepare for careers, students will create a portfolio of materials to help with relocation, employment, and/or graduate school:

- 1) Reel (for directors, editors, cinematographers) or Visual Portfolio (for production/costume designers)
- 2) Résumé and Cover Letter or Artistic Statement/Graduate School Statement of Purpose
- 3) Moving Plan and Six-Month Budget
- 4) Mentor/Networking Plan

Work Standards, Deadlines and Submission: Assignments are to be submitted on the due dates before 12:00pm CT. *I gladly accept early work and never accept late work*. All work turned in for this course must be your own. Having another person complete your work for you, in all or in part, is academically dishonest, i.e. cheating, and may result in a failing grade on the assignment. All work turned in for this course must be original and produced during the current term.

Extra Credit: Extra credit may be received through two methods. First, successfully completing additional coverage assignments beyond the three required for class will result in fifty (50) points of extra credit on your final grade; "successfully" means the coverage would have received an "A" if graded for class. Second, being the first to correctly identify films and shows used on lecture slides will result in five (5) points of extra credit on your final grade. Both methods are repeatable.

Plagiarism: To represent ideas or interpretations taken from another source as one's own is plagiarism. Plagiarism is a serious offense. The academic work of a student must be his or her own. Students must give the author(s) credit for any source material used. To lift content directly from a source without giving credit is a flagrant act. To present a borrowed passage after having changed a few words, even if the source is cited, is also plagiarism.

Al Tools: Artificial intelligence (Al) tools are not permitted for any type of work in this class. If you choose to use these tools, your actions will be considered academically dishonest and a violation of the WKU Student Code of Conduct.
