SPAN 102 LEARNING OUTCOMES

The goal of this course is to continue developing basic communication skills in Spanish. Activities and assignments provide students the opportunity to listen, speak, read, and write. The Targeted Proficiency Level of this course is Novice High. On successful completion of this course you will be able to assert and demonstrate the following:

- I can recognize some ideas about familiar topics expressed in phrases, simple sentences, and frequently used expressions.
- I can identify the main idea in short conversations, messages and announcements.
- I can describe some ideas from simple texts that contain familiar vocabulary.
- I can exchange information about familiar tasks, topics, and activities.
- I can express myself in social interactions using phrases and simple sentences.
- I can write descriptions and short messages to request or provide information on familiar topics using phrases and simple sentences.

In this course, regular and substantive interaction will take place in the following ways:

- Each chapter quiz assesses vocabulary and grammatical structures. Each chapter must be completed before proceeding to the next learning module.
- 2 Compositions and 2 Oral Exams requiring grades / feedback.
- All graded assignments will be graded within a 2-week period, with feedback.

Study Tips and Free Tutoring/Help:

The estimated time you should spend per chapter is between 10 and 15 hours. Of course, this is an average and some vocabulary or grammar sections will be easier than others. Each chapter builds so be sure that you have a good understanding of the structures of one chapter before moving on to the next. Do not try to cram for the midterm and then discard the knowledge. It will be the framework for your final and your oral exams. Another tip is that if you are not writing and/or speaking when you are studying, then you are not studying.

You must take control of the tutoring situation. You must explain to the tutor what you need help with. This free service is highly recommended for those who need more explanation and practice. The Internet is also a wonderful source. You can google whatever you are having issues with (eg/ tener expressions) and a plethora of sites will appear with extra explanations as well as practice quizzes. Tutors are available and provided by the AARC on main campus. Please, see their website for more information.

Learning a language is like constructing a building; if the foundation is not strong, the building will collapse!

How to study for a foreign language:

Learning a second language can seem overwhelming at first. Be patient with yourself. Your brain is actually creating new patterns (which is really cool!) and there is a lot of work involved on your part. The best approach is to tackle the vocabulary first. Go to the last page of each chapter to find all the necessary vocabulary. Write out note cards with English on one side and Spanish on the other and start memorizing the words. You can also download the Cengage app and use the flashcards there. You can also listen to the pronunciation and the dialogues in the ebook. Then, you can start working with the grammar. There are power point slides on blackboard to help walk you through as well as video tutorials in MindTap as you move through the material. You must write and speak while you are studying in order to reinforce what you are learning. Do not attempt to complete the online required activities without first familiarizing yourself with the vocabulary and the grammar. This will only frustrate you and you will waste time looking up just about every word. If you follow this advice, things will flow so much better.

Detailed Description of Components Homework:

You are required to log onto the Cengage MindTap and complete exercises. There are a variety of exercises quizzing you on vocabulary, grammatical structures and culture. The link is on the left-hand menu tab called "Cengage MindTap". Click on that and you will then be taken to the main page of the course.

Do not attempt to complete the online homework without before studying the vocabulary, grammar, and culture sections in each chapter in the book. A more detailed list of pages is provided under the schedule section.

Quizzes

You will have three quizzes over material covered in the chapters. The 1st will be over chapters in the review (1-5), the 2nd will be over chapters 6 and 7, and the 3rd will be over chapters 8 and 9. Each quiz is 20 questions and worth 20 points. They cover vocabulary and grammatical structures in the chapters. Do not attempt to take these quizzes before finishing the material in the chapters covered. You have one opportunity for each quiz. These quizzes will help prepare you for the midterm and final.

Exams:

You will have one midterm and a final over vocabulary and grammatical structures covered in the chapters. The midterm covers information from chapters reviewed and chapters 6 and 7 while the final exam is cumulative but with more emphasis on chapters 8, 9 and 10. To help prepare for the final, I suggest you go over the ¡A repasar! section at the end of each chapter. There is a review sheet and a practice test for both the midterm and the final on blackboard. If you conscientiously read, practice and understand the pages listed in the book and the online exercises, you should do well.

Even though this is an On Demand course and you work at your own pace and at our own time, you are not allowed to take the Midterm and the Final on the same day. Make sure to schedule your Midterm as soon as you finish the first section of the course. This is for your benefit.

Although you do not need to retake the Midterm and Final if you do not pass it, it is highly suggested.

Compositions:

You are required to write two compositions in Spanish. Details descriptions and rubrics can be found on Blackboard. They are to be typed, 1 inch margins on all sides, and double spaced. Once you have uploaded your papers onto Blackboard, send me an email to let me know in order to expedite grading.

Oral Exams:

You will complete two oral exams. The first is presentational and the second is interpersonal and will require you to make an appointment with me to complete. You must complete the second oral exam at least two weeks before you take the final exam. Detailed explanations of both as well as rubrics can be found on Blackboard.
