Course Description:

Ethics codes, professional behaviors, and legal issues in applied psychology.

Course Objectives:

As a result of participating in this class, students will:

- 1) develop an understanding of the APA and NASP ethics codes;
- 2) develop an ability to think through ethical dilemmas by applying appropriate ethical and legal standards to the dilemmas;
- 3) develop an understanding of how ethics and laws guide the practice of psychology;
- 4) develop an understanding of the ethical implications of providing psychological services to culturally diverse clientele;
- 5) understand how federal special education law (IDEA-04), federal regulations, and state rules guide the practice of school psychology;
- 6) develop an understanding of how the U.S. Constitution and case law impact special education and school psychological services; and
- 7) understand how Section 504 relates to school psychological services.

I. Chapter Quizzes:

Quizzes will be given over each Jacob et al. (2022) textbook chapter on the day the reading is assigned, unless otherwise noted. These quizzes will be in a multiple-choice format. The quizzes have several purposes such as providing you with external motivation to read and review the textbook, facilitating classroom discussions, giving you feedback on your understanding of the material, and giving me feedback on what material was understood. Point value of each quiz is listed in the class schedule.

II. Presentation:

In general, the assignment calls for each student to develop a presentation on a topic. (Topics will be randomly assigned.) Each presentation should be professionally done (e.g., PowerPoint, formal presentation style) and the information presented should be useful and practical to the class participants. The topics may require varying lengths of time to present; however, plan on approximately 20-30 minutes. A handout (1 to 2 pages) summarizing key points should be distributed to the class participants.

III. Exams:

The exams emphasize the application of the material covered in class (e.g., APA and NASP ethical codes, case law, special education law, the Kentucky Administrative Regulations). The exams will consist of short answer and essay questions.

IV. <u>Professional Behaviors:</u>

Professional behaviors include such things as attendance, timeliness, participation in class, disruptions of instruction, professional attitude, courtesy toward others, and writing skills (e.g., spelling, grammar). Points will be given based on my subjective evaluation of your professional behaviors (inside and outside of the classroom) at the end of the term.
