Course Description: GEOG 103 (GEOL 103):

Our Dynamic Planet will introduce the spatial dimension of Earth's dynamic systems with a special emphasis on how their many interrelationships affect humans and their environment. These systems include air, water, weather, climate, tectonics, landforms, and ecosystems.

Learning Objectives for Colonnade Program:

The course objectives for GEOG 103 (GEOL 103) are designed to integrate fully with the Colonnade Program. Upon successfully completing GEOG 103(GEOL 103), you will be able to:

- Demonstrate knowledge of basic earth system characteristics applied to the physical laws of science.
- Describe the physical forces that interact to yield the weather, climate, geologic, and hydrologic processes of a specific location.
- Observe and interpret visual representations of variations and trends in earth systems, such as energy, temperature, water, carbon, and landforms.
- Identify and apply applicable information to real-life situations, and communicate said information effectively.

2- Material needed:

- Text: (Required) Physical Geography: A Landscape Appreciation 11th edition by Darrel Hess. Published by Pearson. I recommend an e-text version that can be purchased from the publisher. The exercises are built on the 11th edition so if you purchase an earlier edition there may be a few discrepancies but it will work.
- You must use your topper/WKU email.

Grades & Course Expectations:

- Grading Scale: The grading scale is as follows: A (90% 100%), B (80-90%), C (70-80%), D (60-70%), F (Below 60%). Keep track of your grades on Blackboard. Curving will be done by my discretion. There is no extra credit, please do not ask.
- The final course grade is based on: Exams (5) 65% Exercise 15% Quizzes 20%
- Exams are timed and closed book. Students must pass the each exam with a 60% or higher before moving on to the next unit. If an exam score is below 60% then students are encourage to spend more time on the material and to retake the exam when better prepared. This must be established with the instructor before the retake will be available. Moving on to the next unit should not begin until the current exam has been passed. The second score must be greater than 60% but the grade received, for the exam, will be an average of the two exam scores. If students fail the exam twice then the student and instructor will meet to establish what must take place.
