<u>Quizzes:</u> There will be a quiz for each chapter with none of them being cumulative. **Quizzes will be taken on Blackboard with the Lockdown Browser by Respondus**. The quizzes are timed allowing only 15 minutes for 10 multiple choice questions. The quizzes are open notes, but you will be in a lockdown browser that does not allow leaving the quiz on that device. Final Exam: There will be a multiple-choice final exam that is cumulative. **The final exam will be taken on Blackboard with the Lockdown Browser by Respondus.** The final exam is timed allowing only 80 minutes for 60 multiple choice questions.
