Course Description:

History 102 is a course that provides an introduction to the world's history since 1500. This course is designed to assist you in gaining a better understanding of the diversity, connections, and major world events that have occurred globally since 1500. We will implement the textbook and primary source documents in this course to improve and master your analytical and literacy skills that will also assist your critical thinking skills. In addition to the readings, this course will include weekly discussion posts about each of the readings assigned each week, along with reading guide questions that will be used to help you understand critical events of the time periods we cover. We will also have 2 essays that will be based on a select few primary source documents and readings and one research paper that will serve as your final. These assignments will help you improve your analytical skills, critical thinking skills, literacy skills, while also providing you with a good grasp on historical perspective and interpretation. An important aspect of this course is learning how our world has been shaped by major historical figures, events, and cultures that are interconnected, while also noting how people have responded to various situations and how these responses have shaped the world it is to this day.

Course Structure:

This course is asynchronous, which means there are no required class meetings and everything will be strictly online. I will send weekly email/Blackboard announcements on Tuesday nights with framing remarks of the readings for the week. You will have one discussion post of 500 words or more due every Wednesday by midnight, along with two separate responses to two of your classmates' posts due every Friday by midnight. If due dates change for any reason, I will send out an email and a Blackboard announcement letting everyone know as well update our course schedule on Blackboard. I will actively monitor the discussion boards each week to ensure that everyone is participating and engaging in meaningful conversations about the readings for every week.

Monday and Tuesday: Monday and Tuesday should be utilized for reading. I will email/post an announcement on Blackboard with framing remarks with a brief summary of the readings, along with questions that will help guide your thoughts of the week's readings on Tuesday night.

Wednesday by midnight: Students should submit a discussion post of at least 500 words or more to the Blackboard discussion board that summarizes the reading and/or displays your analytical and critical thinking and interpretations of the readings.

Friday by midnight: Each student should respond to at least two classmates' posts in a meaningful, thoughtful, and polite manner. Each response should be at least 200 words please.

Major themes in this course include:

- Ideologies, Ethics and Lived experiences
- Production, Consumption, and their Human and Environmental Consequences
- Change, Continuity and Connections
- Cross-Cultural Interaction and Transfers
- Spectrum of Power Relations: Dominance, Interdependence, Agency/Resistance

Course Objectives:

This course helps fulfill requirements for Category A: Foundations - Intellectual and Practical Skills in the Western Kentucky University General Education program. After successful completion of this course students will be able to:

- Understand the concept and practice of history as an interpretive framework
- Comprehend significant events, diverse peoples, and major turning points and ideas in world history
- Understand cause and effect relationships in history and historical methodology
- Analyze and interpret primary and secondary sources
- Think critically to construct informed arguments based on evidence
- Communicate ideas effectively in written and oral formats
- Write analytical essays applying historical knowledge, theory, and research methods

Students will demonstrate the ability to:

- Demonstrate knowledge of at least one area of the social and behavioral sciences.
- Apply knowledge, theories, and research methods, including ethical conduct, to analyze problems pertinent to at least one area of the social and behavioral sciences.
- Understand and demonstrate how at least one area of the social and behavioral sciences conceptualizes diversity and the ways it shapes human experience.
- Integrate knowledge of at least one area of the social and behavioral sciences into issues of personal or public importance.
- Communicate effectively using the language and terminology germane to at least one area of the social and behavioral sciences.
- Students will read, comprehend, and analyze primary texts independently and proficiently.

Students will be expected to be able:

- To identify the general outlines of Modern World History including a basic understanding of the major themes, historical events, cultural developments, and individuals of modern global civilizations.
- To compare and contrast general aspects of political, religious, economic and social systems from Modern World civilizations.

- To describe and analyze global processes from 1500 C.E. to the present (e.g human migration, imperialism, industrialism, nationalism, globalization).
- To explain cause and effect relationships in history.
- To compare and contrast historical experiences across world cultures during the Modern era.
- To demonstrate a developing historical objectivity, an increasing awareness of the problem of personal bias and opinion, and an ability to use a clear thesis and comparison of ideas in written work.

Grade Breakdown:

700 points: Discussion Posts/Responses

100 points: Colonnade Assignment Essay

100 points: Primary Source Essay

100 points: Research Paper

Grading Breakdown: This course's assignments add up to a total of 1000 points. Note that a great deal of your points come from your discussion posts/responses, so be sure to do the readings and construct thoughtful and meaningful posts each week.

Discussion Guidelines:

Students' discussion posts and responses should be meaningful, self analytical, and display an understanding of the material read for each week. **For the responses, please don't post a comment stating simply, "I agree", the responses are to be thoughtful and meant to continue the conversation about whatever topic we are discussing.** As stated previously, students' initial posts should be at least 500 words, while students' response to at least two classmates should be at least 200 words for each response. The initial post is due Wednesday by midnight, while the two or more responses are due Friday by midnight. I am merely looking for your comprehension of the reading and, more importantly, your own thoughts and perspectives of the readings.

It is important to note that everyone is to be respectful of varying opinions that have corroborated with evidence. Additionally, there should not be any inappropriate language, comments, and/or behavior within our discussion boards in this course. If there is any inappropriate language, comments, and/or behavior I will be subjected to intervene ASAP to tackle this issue.

Reading Guide Questions:

In each module for every week, you will be assigned a reading guide that will assist you in gaining a better understanding of the readings for each week. These reading guides will include various questions on the chapter and/or other readings that we read each week. The questions will help guide your discussion posts and responses, while also helping you absorb the correct information needed to successfully complete this course. You do **not** have to turn in these reading guides, but I will and should be able to tell if you paid attention to the questions/readings in your discussion posts and your short answer questions each week. You also do **not** have to answer each reading guide question in your

discussion post. These are primarily to help you navigate the reading and assist your critical thinking as you read.

Essay Guidelines:

There will be three essays due throughout this course. One will be the “Colonnade Assignment” primary source paper, the second paper will be a primary source essay, and the other will be a research paper that will serve as our “final” at the end of this course. Both primary source papers should be at least 800 words long and the research paper should be at least 1000 words long. You should follow the Chicago format for your citations/footnotes. You will also find the guidelines for each paper under the “Essay Guideline Information/Submission” module on Blackboard.

Late Assignments and Grade Questions:

Please reach out if any issues or if life happens, I will be happy to work to help you arrange a later due date for these assignments/discussion posts. If you do not contact me, I will take off 5 points each day the assignment is overdue, so please ensure that you email me and let me know!

Attendance:

Attendance will be based on your discussion participation. Please ensure that you actively participate in the discussion board questions and responses to make sure that you will gain the full participation points. Failure to participate in discussion posts will result in a failing grade since discussion participation is worth a major portion of your final grade.
